SUBJECT: Board of Corrections Report for June, 2023

Enclosed you will find the monthly report.

• **Enclosure 1 (Administrative Services):**

- We concluded the fiscal year \$34,458 under budget while also being able to encumber funds to complete safety renovations that transcend into FY24.
- \$382,910 were spent on overtime costs in June, this is a slight increase over the previous month which is largely attributed to recertification training we are conducting now that we have achieved high staffing levels.
- Over \$800,000 in bond payments were processed.

• **Enclosure 2 (Community Corrections /Reentry Services):**

- The Sanction Center and Transitional Discharge Center placed a total of twenty-three individuals in Community Corrections and saved a combined 101 bed days.
- Work Release
 - Admitted 34 individuals
- House Arrest
 - House Arrest admitted 72 individuals
- Reentry Assistance Program (RAP)
 - RAP admitted 21 individuals
 - One individual achieved a GED
- Reentry Services/Therapeutic Communities
 - 92 individuals were admitted to therapeutic community housing units

- Pre-trial Services
 - Full integration of data systems is in progress for the revised Pretrial Release supervision program.
 - 264 Individuals were placed on Pretrial Release
 - 1,029 Individuals were supervised on Pretrial Release
 - 477 Individuals participated in 24/7 Sobriety
 - 145 Individuals were supervised via GPS monitors
 - 3,001 jail bed days were saved
 - Law library utilization via the tablet system continues to be strong and has increased every month.
- **Enclosure 3 (ACA, NCCHC, PREA - Compliance)**
 - Preparation for our upcoming American Correctional Association audit is ramping up. Between the Jail and Community Corrections we have a total of 634 standards that we will demonstrate compliance with. The audit is scheduled for October 30th–November 3rd. Our accreditation hearing will take place at the ACA winter conference in Washington, DC in January, 2024.
- **Enclosure 4 (Personnel)**
 - Eight officers below the rank of Sergeant left employment in June.
 - Five officers were promoted to CO II in June.
 - As June 30th, we were 98% staffed. After shifting our focus to required training for various recertification we have an academy for an expected twenty new officers beginning on July 24.
 - Several staff members received service awards for twenty and twenty-five years of service to DCDC.
- **Enclosure 5 (Population)**
 - Admissions 1,268, an increase of 47
 - Releases 1,319
 - High Count 1,145
 - Low Count 1,072
 - Average daily population (ADP)
 - 1,103, an increase of 55
 - Custodial Sanction Bed Days
 - 67, a decrease
 - U.S. Marshal population decreased slightly
 - Felony pre-trial population increased
 - Misdemeanor pre-trial population remained stable
 - Probation violations remained stable
 - 18% of our population were between the ages of 18-24, up slightly from the previous month
 - 65% of our population were minorities, down slightly from the previous month
 - 14% of our population were female
 - 18% of our population were homeless or near homeless, a modest increase
- **Enclosure 6 (Medical)**
 - Intake Screenings
 - 1,140
 - Health and Physical Assessments
 - 367
 - Inmates were sent out thirty-two times for emergent medical care. Six of those were by 911. There were nine hospital admissions, which resulted in 79 days of hospitalization.
 - There were 46 offsite specialty medical appointments.
 - Due to the expiration of the public health emergency and a depletion of our covid vaccine supplies, vaccine clinics are no longer being regularly offered. We await further guidance on how vaccine will be distributed and administered going forward.

- **Enclosure 7 (Mental Health)**
 - Initial Psychiatric Assessments
 - 185
 - Initial Mental Health Assessments
 - 470
 - Mental Health Infirmary Placements (suicide precautions)
 - 83
 - Individuals placed on drug and alcohol withdrawal protocols

 - Referrals to Community Based Mental Health Services
 - Board of Mental Health Referrals
 - 35, perhaps the highest number on record
 - Long Term Psychiatric Facility (Lincoln Regional Center)
 - 5
 - 46% of our population was diagnosed with a mental illness
- **Enclosure 8 (Security Operations & Honor Guard)**
 - Crisis Negotiation Team (CNT)
 - There was one deployment, which resulted in a successful de-escalation without force being required to relocate a suicidal individual to a safer housing location.
 - The CNT team trained to recertify for use of the rescue phone.
 - Correctional Emergency Response & Transport Team (CERTT)
 - There was deployment for a cell extraction for an individual threatening suicide. The individual was moved without force being required.
 - Searches
 - Twenty-one searches of housing units were conducted. Contraband recovered modified items for tattooing, modified items to create a spark, notes on how to use “cash app” to purchase contraband, powdery substance which was not tested due to fentanyl protocol and suspected K-2 which was submitted for testing, though the results were inconclusive.
 - Honor Guard
 - The honor guard provided services at the Justice Center dedication ceremony as well as presentation of Colors at a College World Series game.
- **Enclosure 9 (Staff Development, Wellness & Retention)**
 - Thirty individuals were interviewed for Correctional Officer positions.
 - Thirty-five applications were received.
 - Forty Officers completed Field Training
 - Eleven staff members utilized the Wellness and Retention office for assistance for the first time. An additional 18 staff members received ongoing services.
 - Two staff members were referred to external mental health resources.
 - Yoga for First Responder Classes were offered weekly.
 - Utilization of the Peer Support App increased from the previous month.
- **Other noteworthy items**
 - Work on the facility-wide safety project continues. When concluded, all housing units with a top tier will have safety netting installed and top bunks are being replaced. The safety netting has already paid dividends as two incidents of self-harm were thwarted. The male and female infirmaries have reopened in their designated location after renovations were completed. Two other units have now been closed for the safety enhancement renovations. This project will continue throughout much of the balance of 2023.
 - Plans to reopen the lobby to public visitation were completed and on site visitation resumed on July 5th.

- Lastly, a final look back at the American Jail Association Conference from May.
 - Two quotes from the “American Jails” magazine
 - Louis Quinones, newly installed AJA president, “The Douglas County Department of Corrections served as the host agency. A huge shout out goes to Douglas County for acting as such a cordial and welcoming host. Many conference attendees participated in their local jail tours and commented favorably on the experience.”
 - From Chris Daniels, AJA Executive Director, “Best Conference Ever. I repeatedly heard that phrase our AJA Conference and Jail Expo in Omaha. I heard it from our exhibitors, our attendees, our presenters, our Program Planning Committee, and our Board of Directors.”... “If you were not at the Omaha Conference you really missed out!”... “It was good vibes all the way around and everyone who attended fell in love with Omaha.”

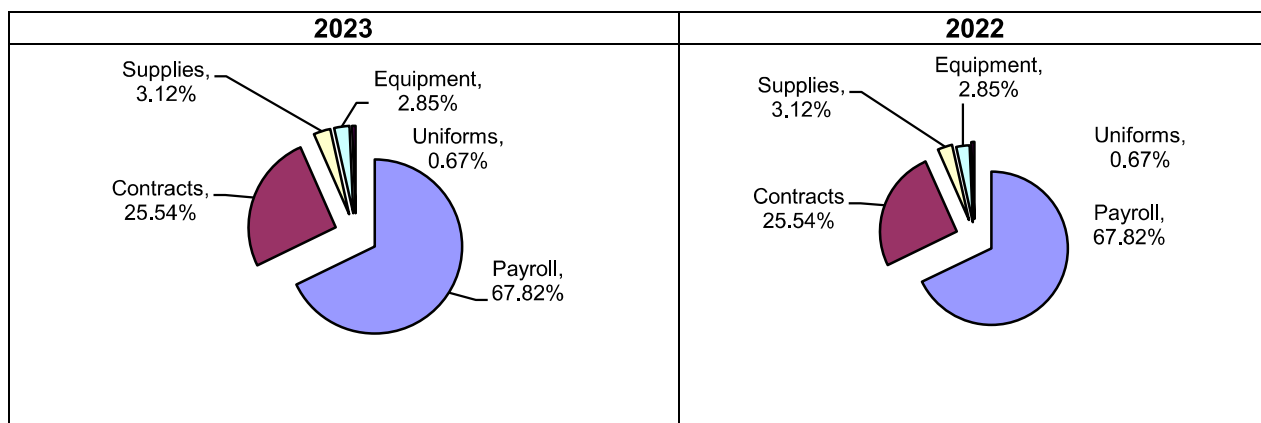
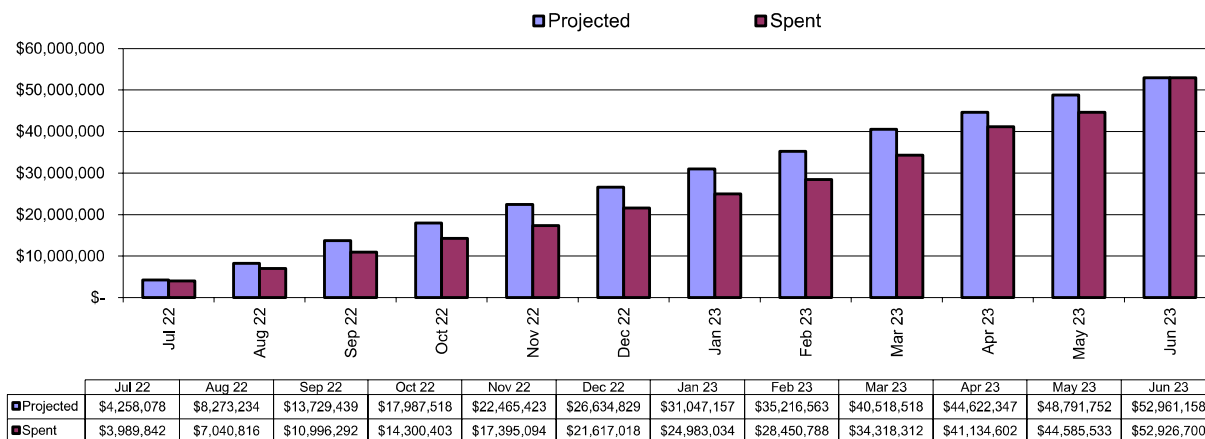
BACKGROUND: Having completed the final month (June 2023) of the budget year July 2022-June 2023, the following is a summary of our budget and staffing:

Expenses:

We ended our fiscal year **\$34,458 under budget**. We projected we would have spent \$52,961,158 while actual expenditures were \$52,926,700. We have encumbered for safety projects and contracts in place. Following is a breakdown:

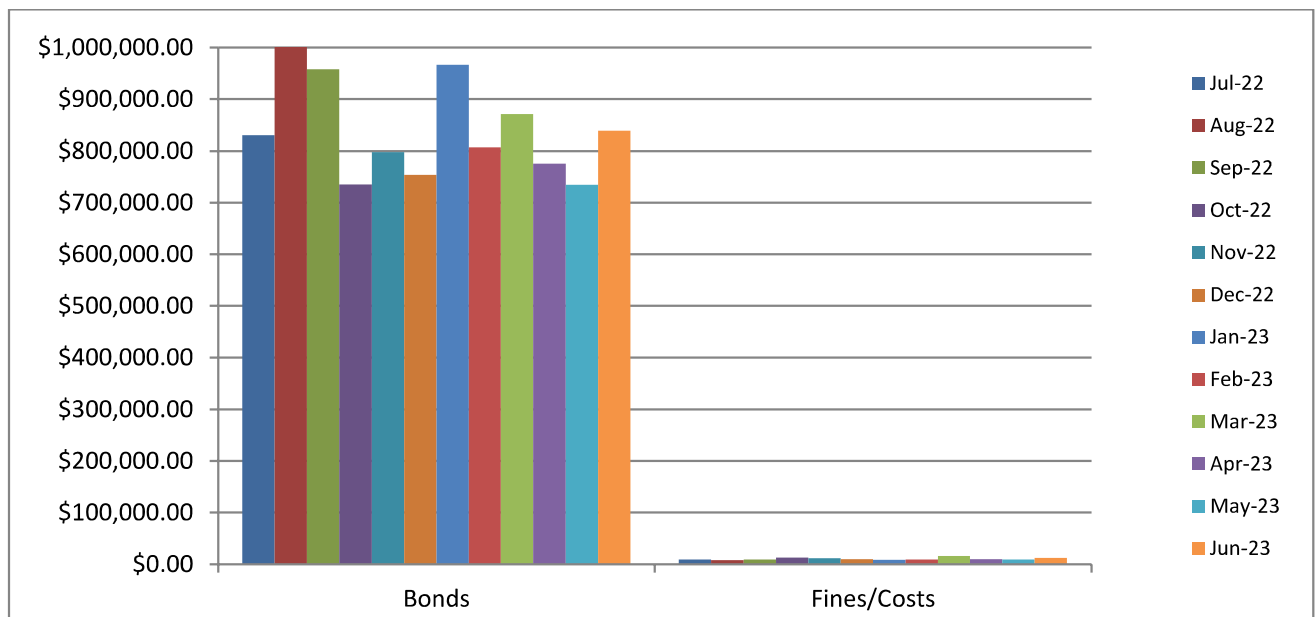

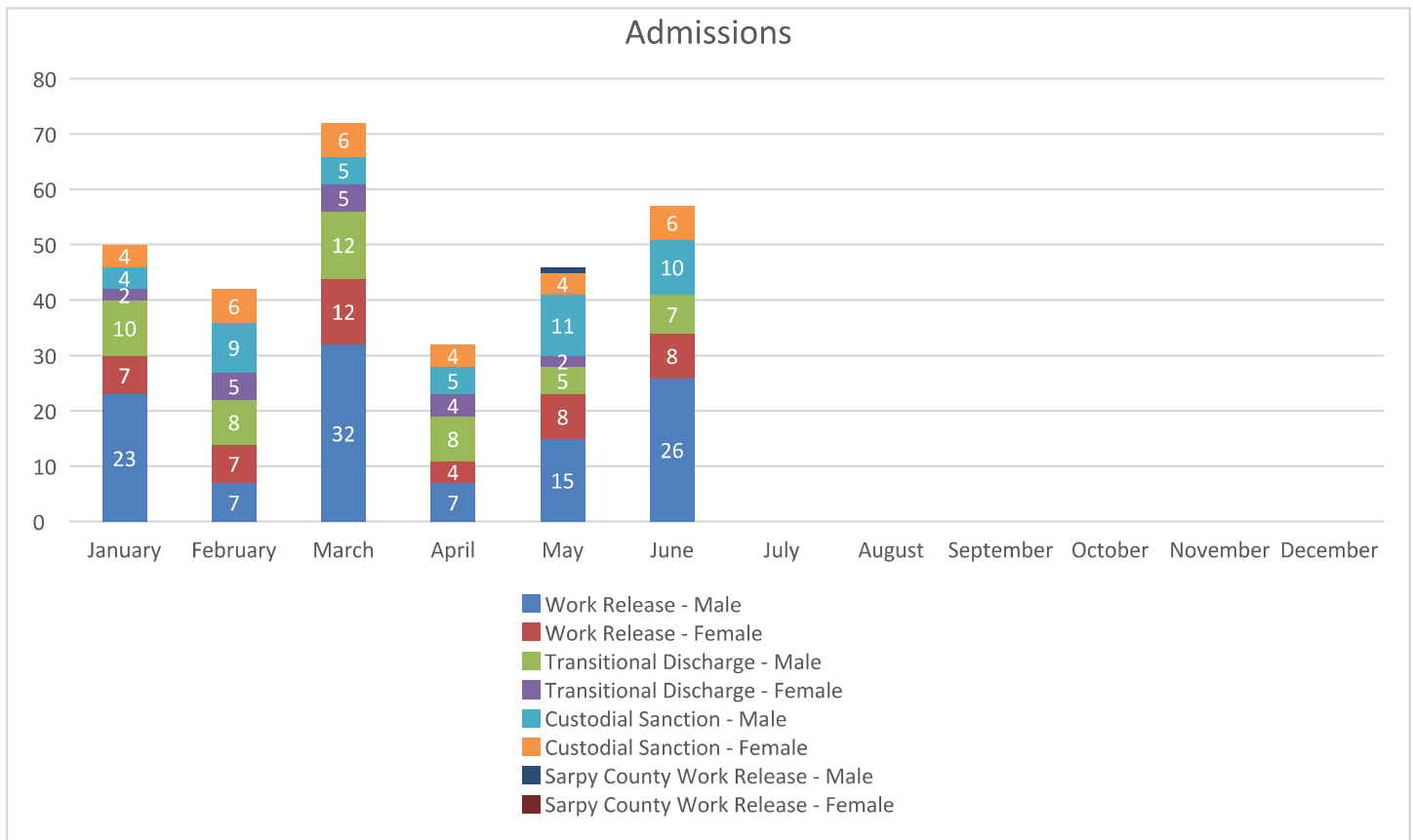
The following graph shows the total Bonds/Fines and Costs collected for incarcerated individuals:



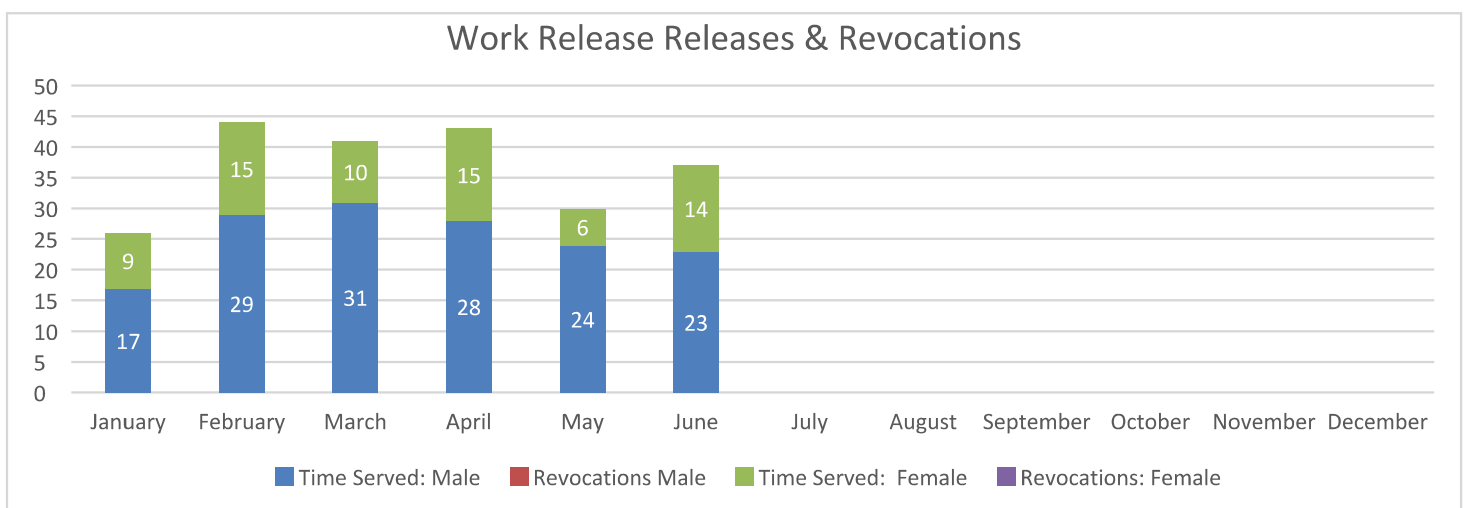

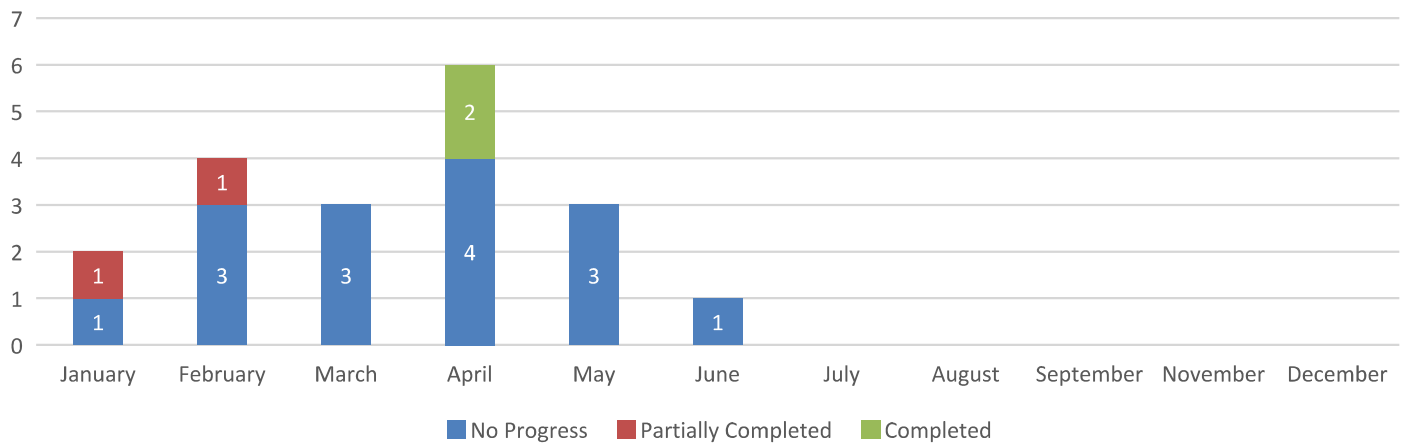
Goals completion summary for individuals who were discharged during the reporting month



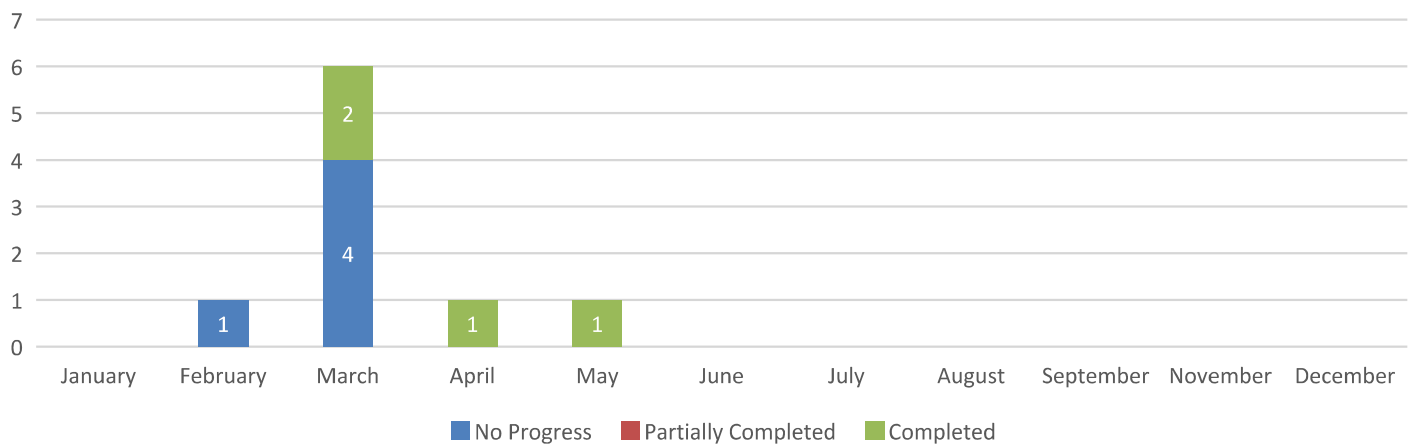

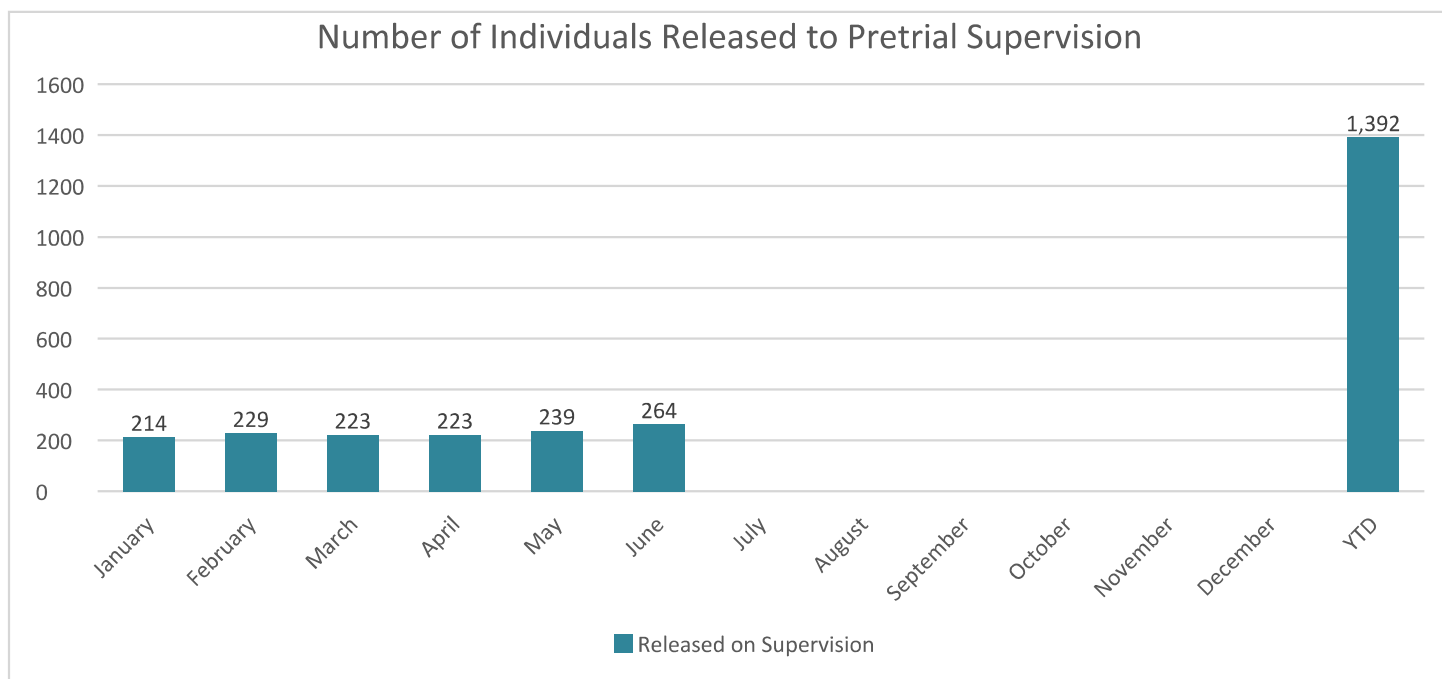

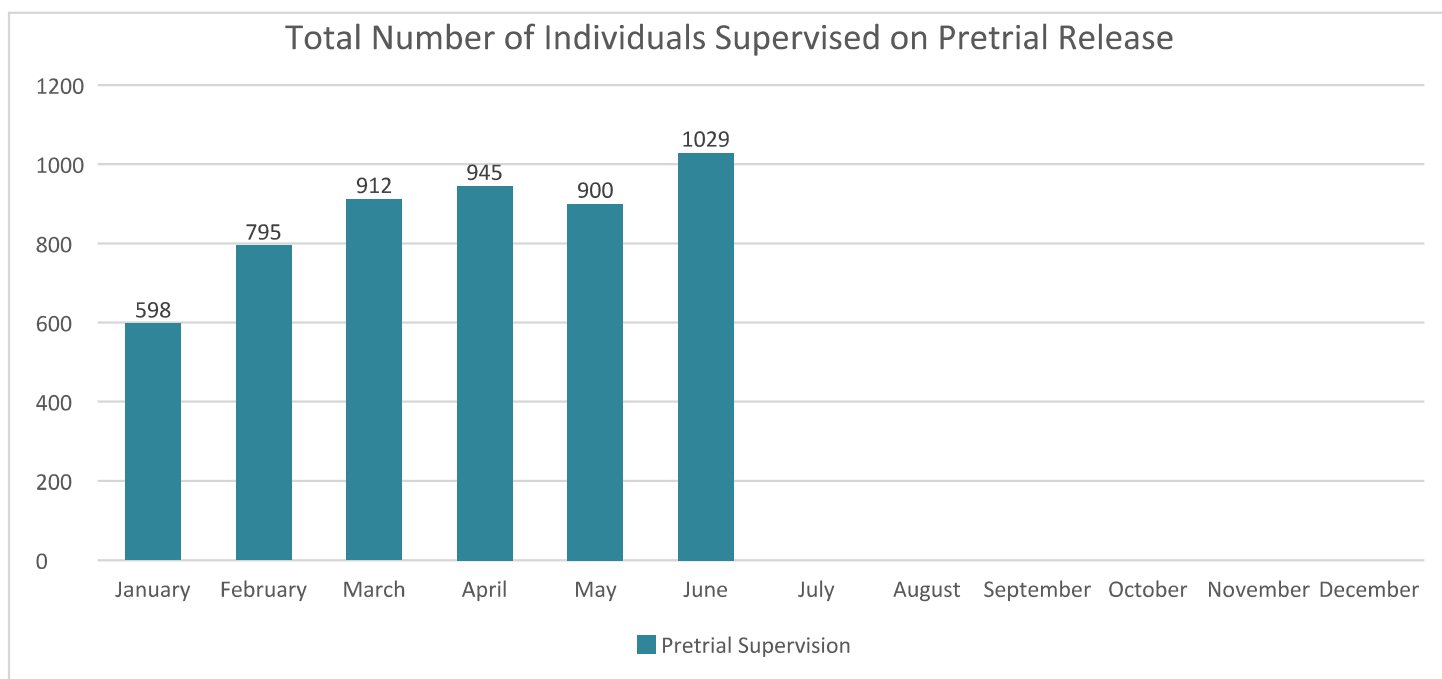

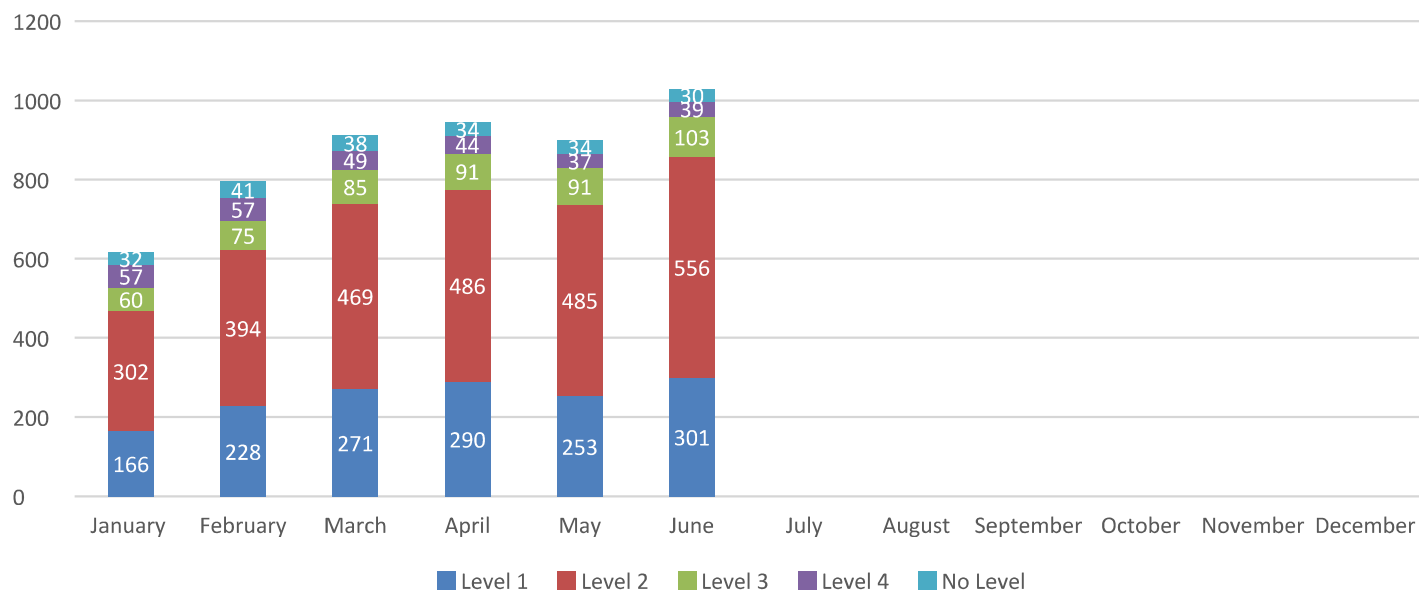

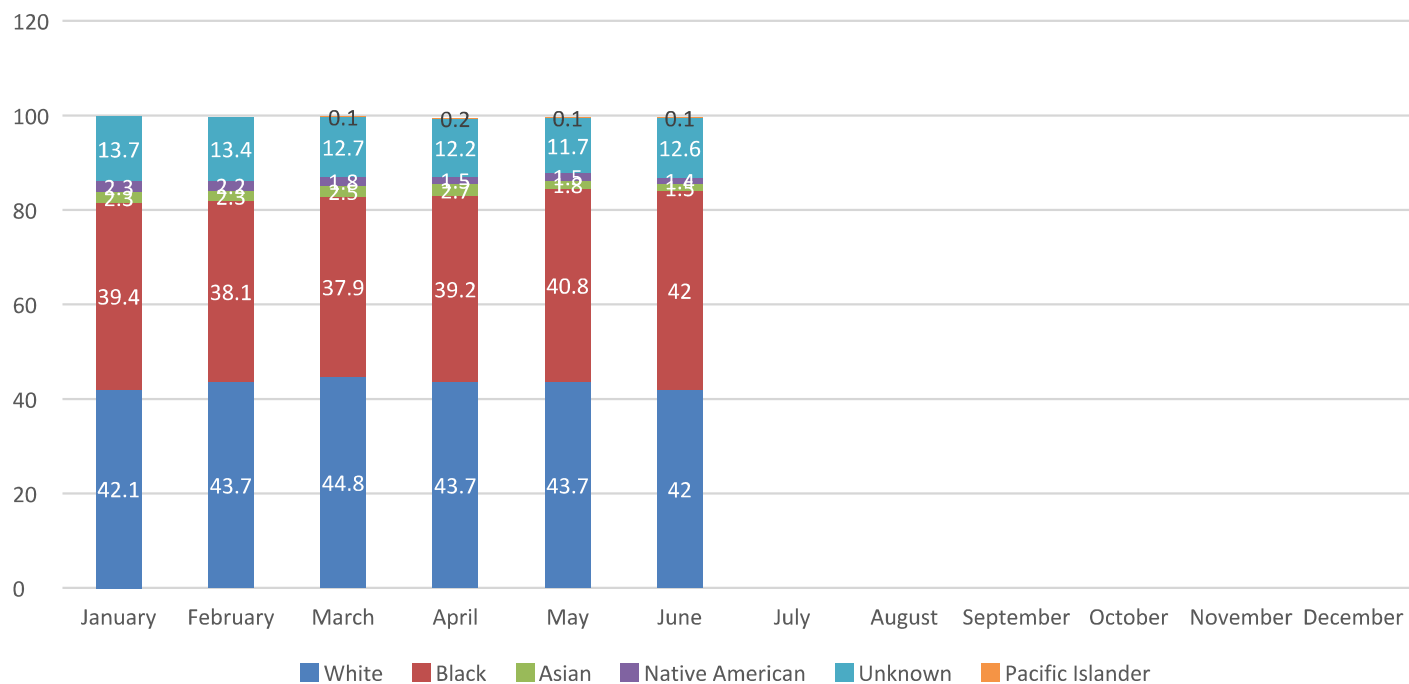

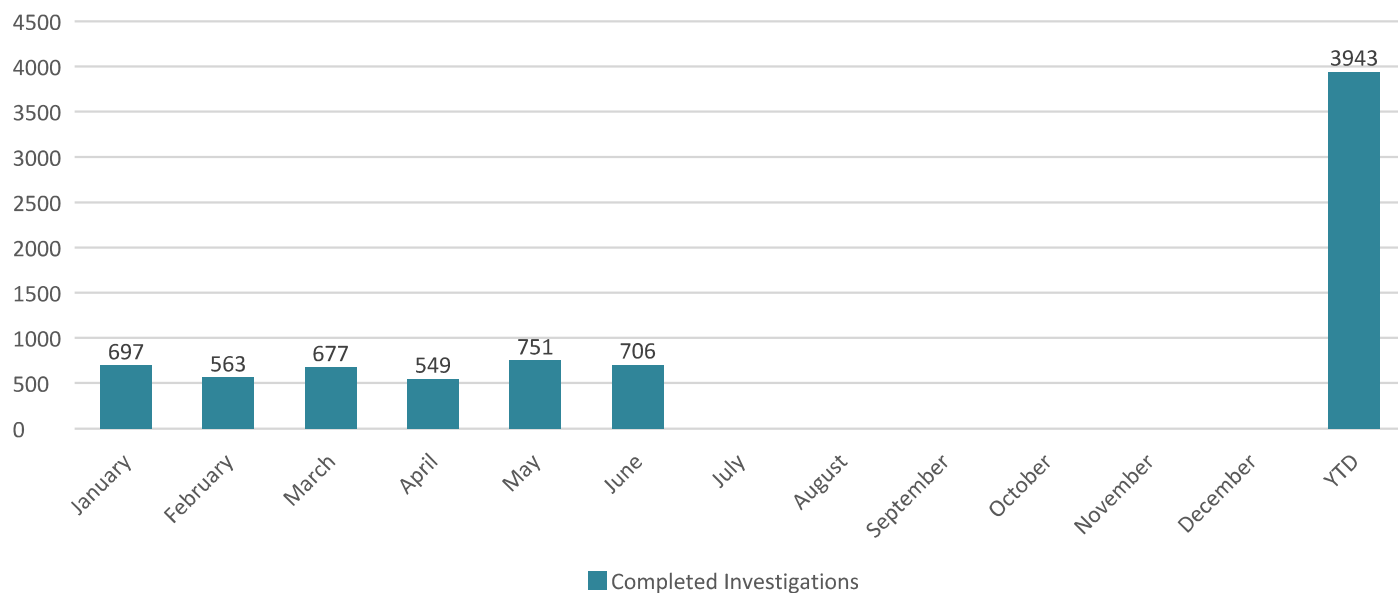
Number of Individuals Supervised by Supervision Level



Percentage of Individuals Supervised on Pretrial Release by Race

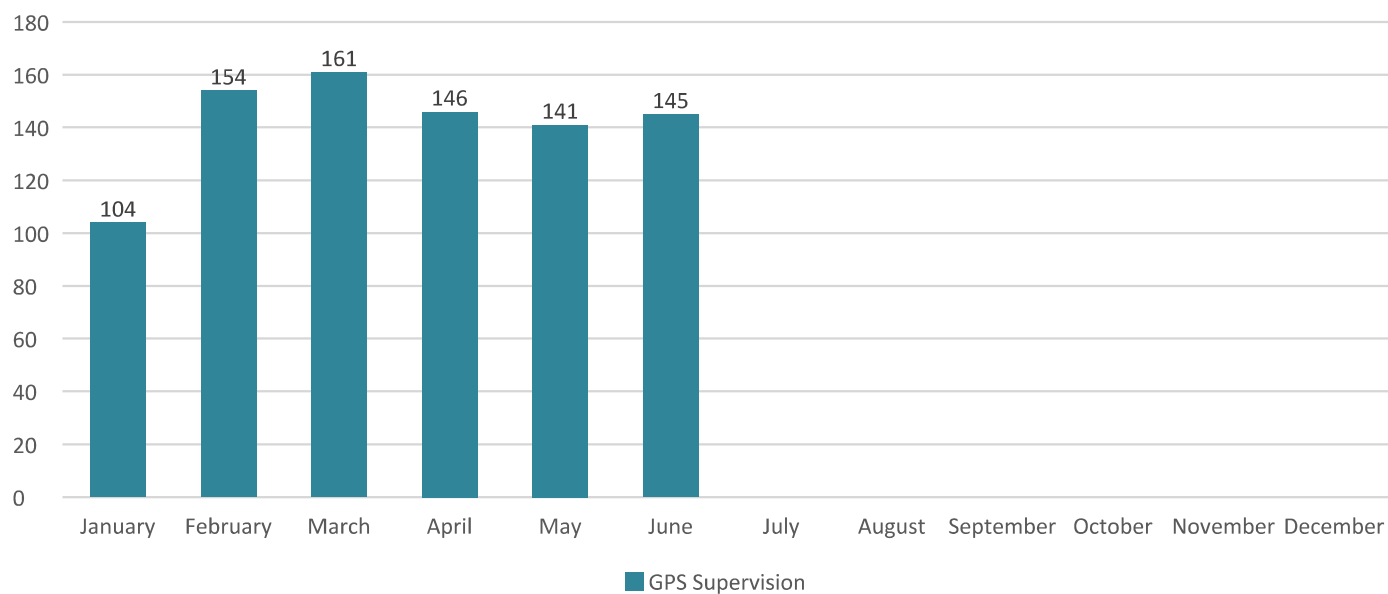

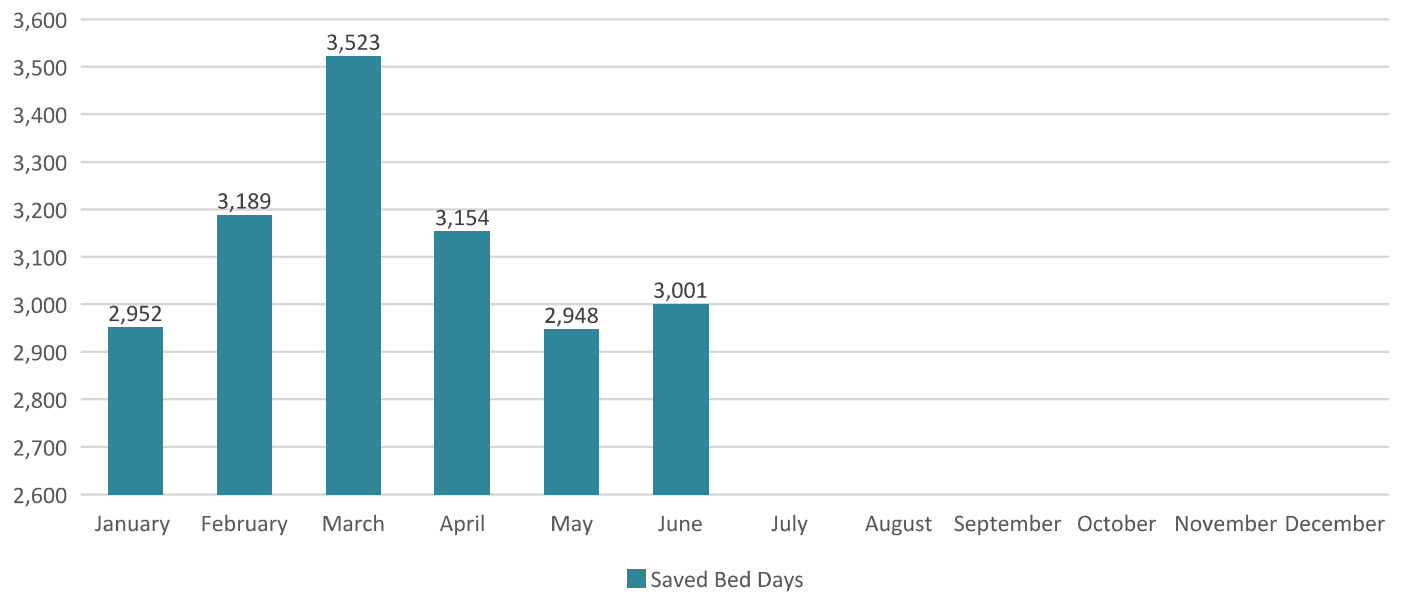


Number of Individuals who were reviewed for Pretrial Release Supervision

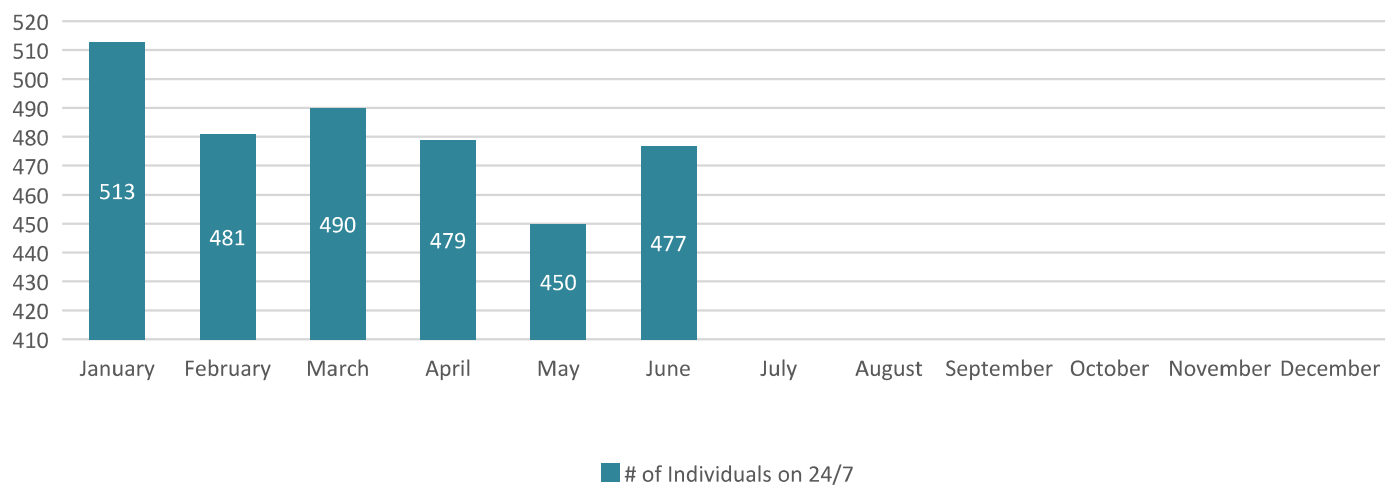
Number of Individuals on Pretrial Release GPS



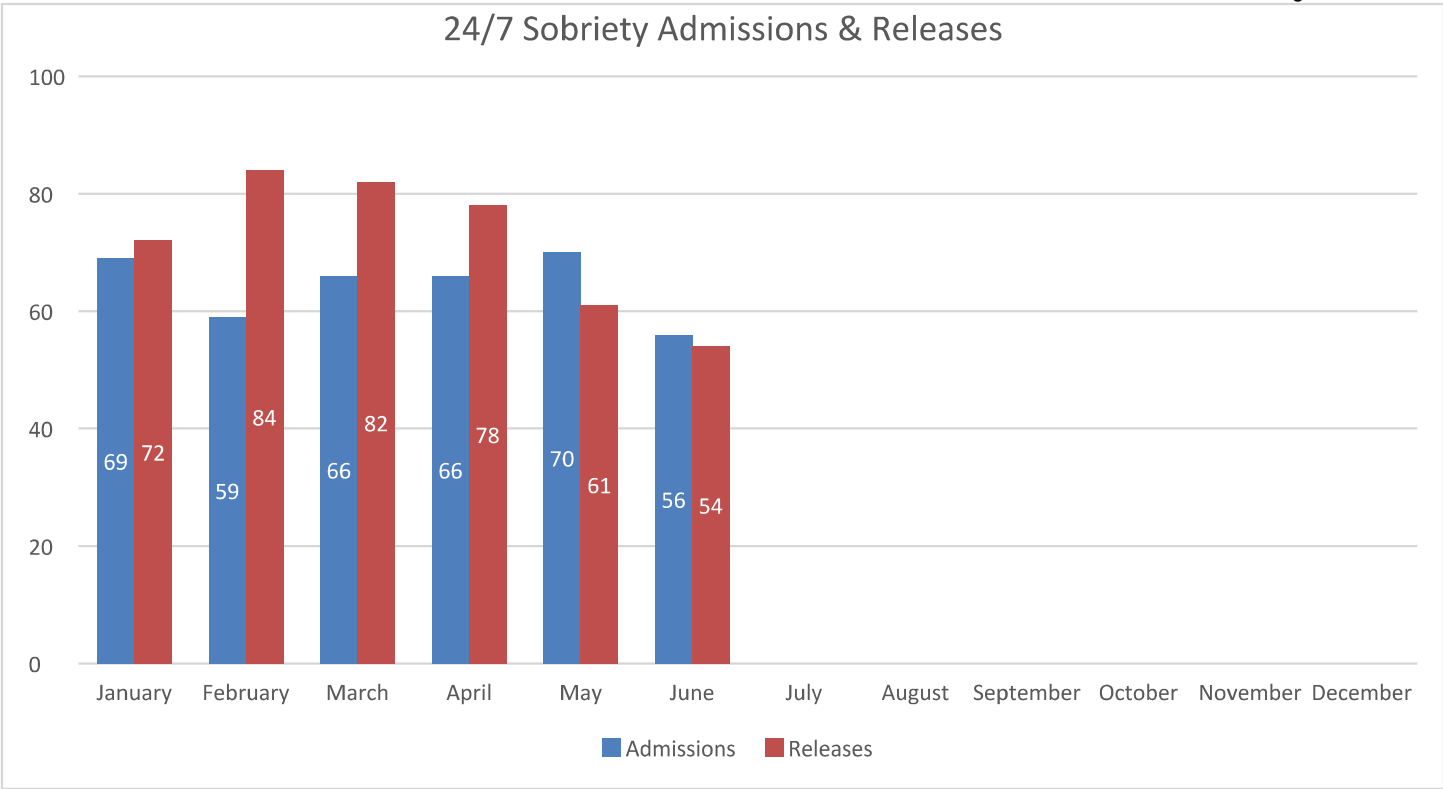
Bed Days Saved by Pretrial GPS

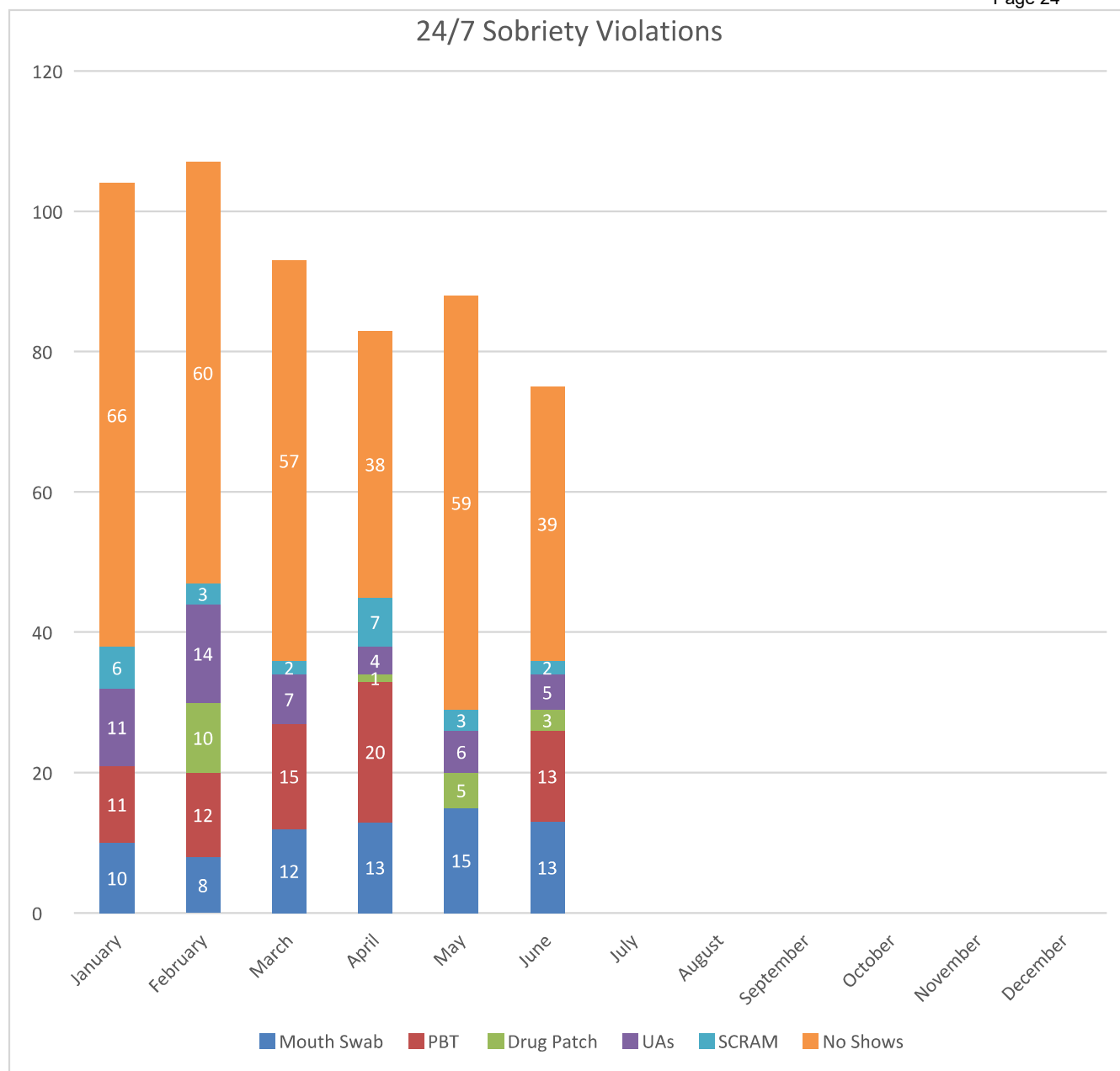


Number of Individuals on 24/7 Sobriety

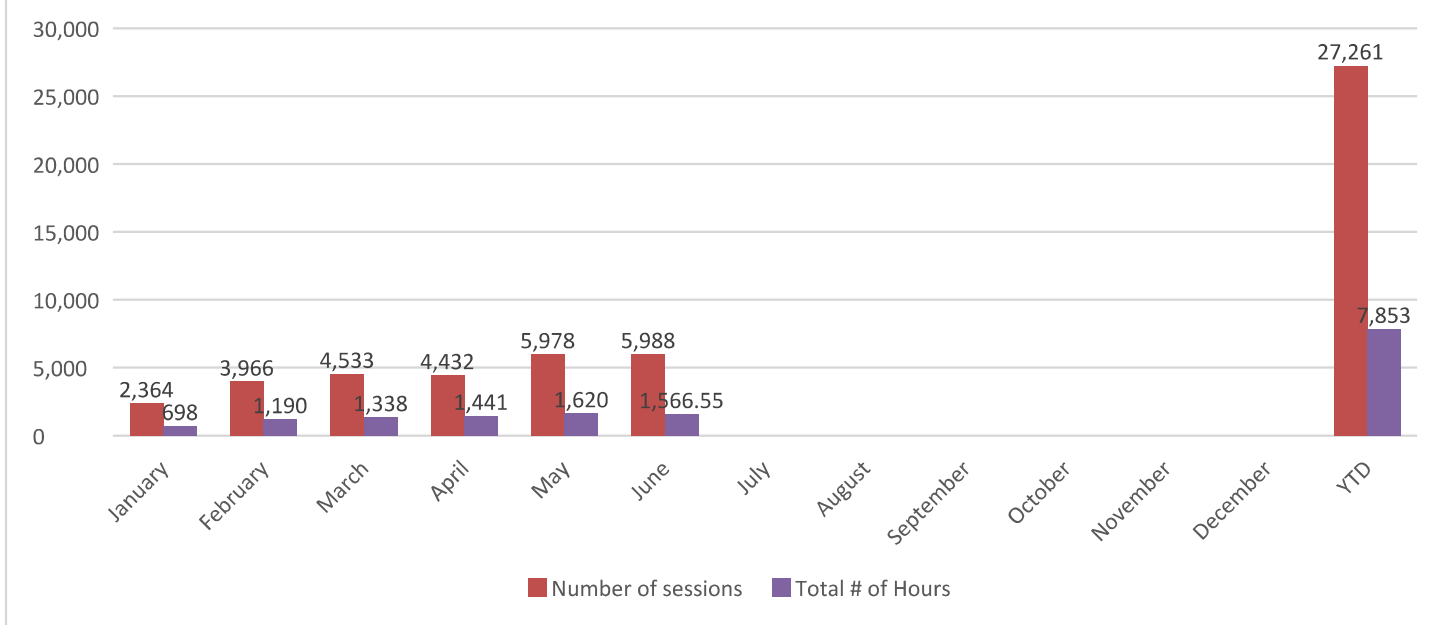




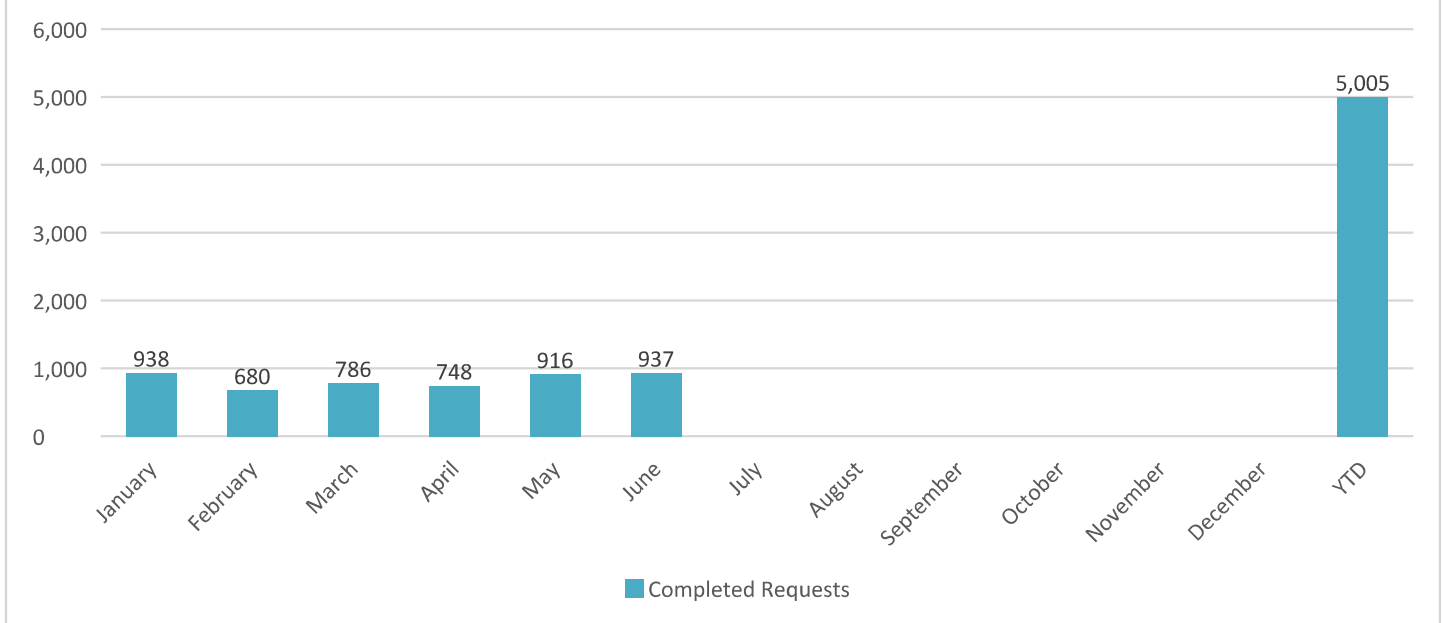

- Board of Mental Health Orders are us this month.

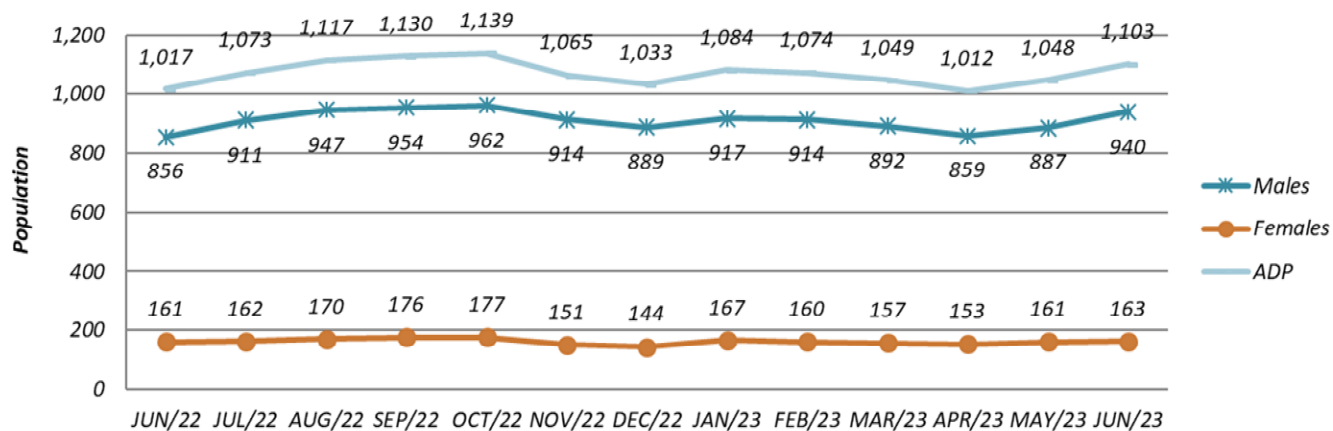

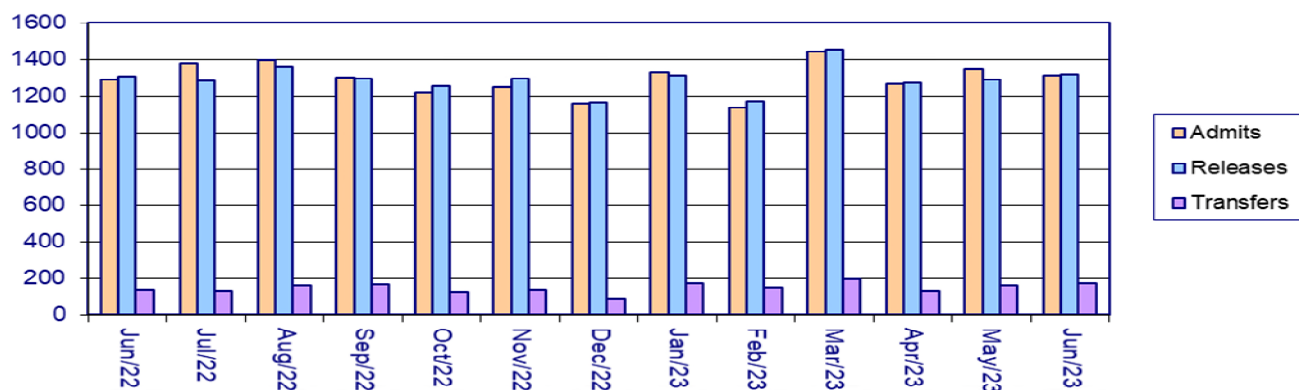

Population History

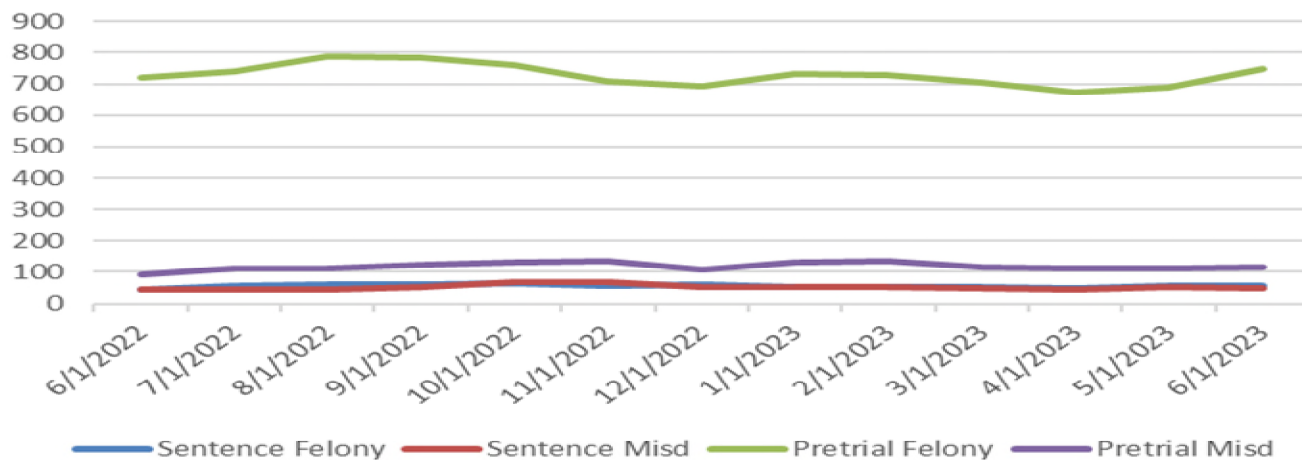


Monthly Admissions, Releases, and Transfers to CJC, hospital, LRC and other Counties

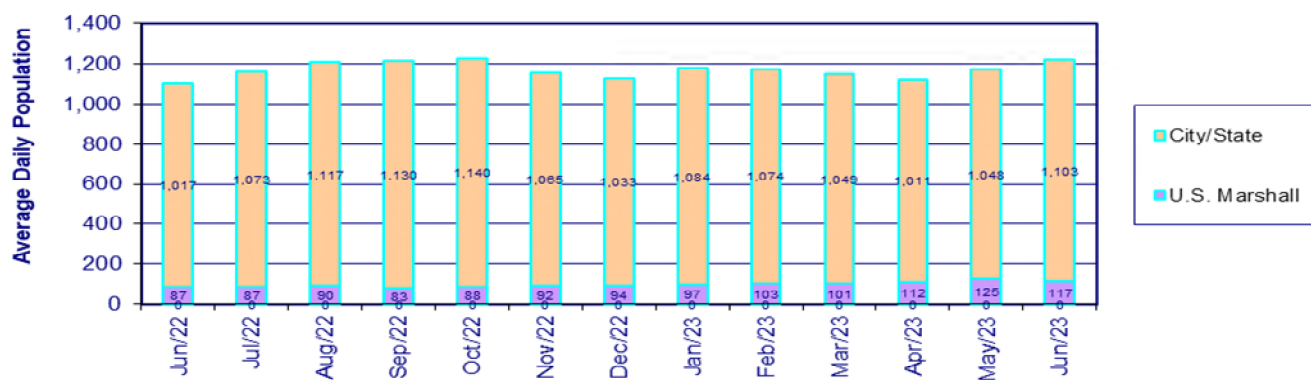

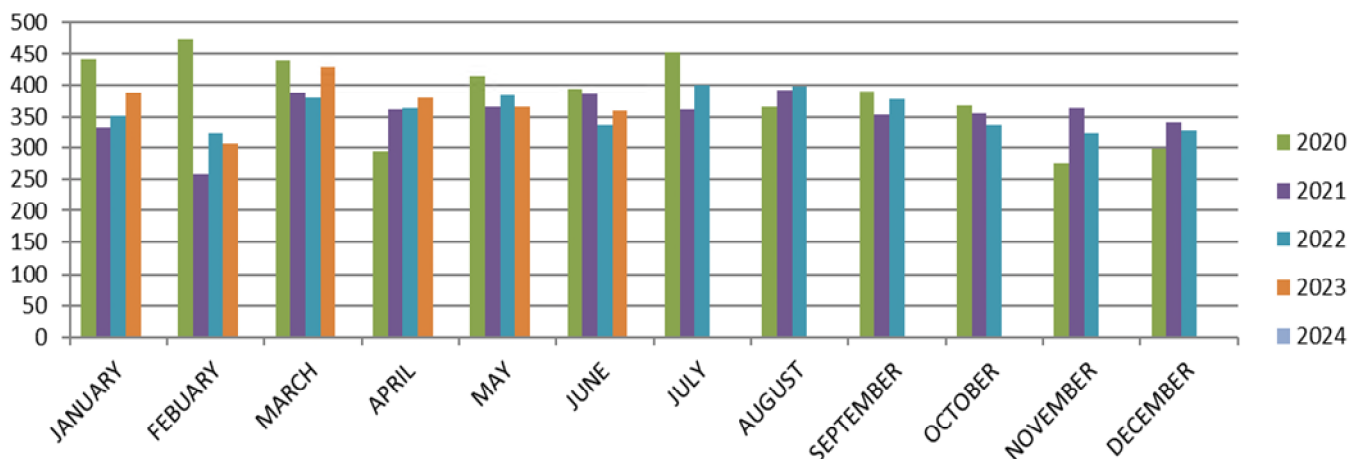
Average Felony & Misdemeanor Jail Population



Contracted Beds

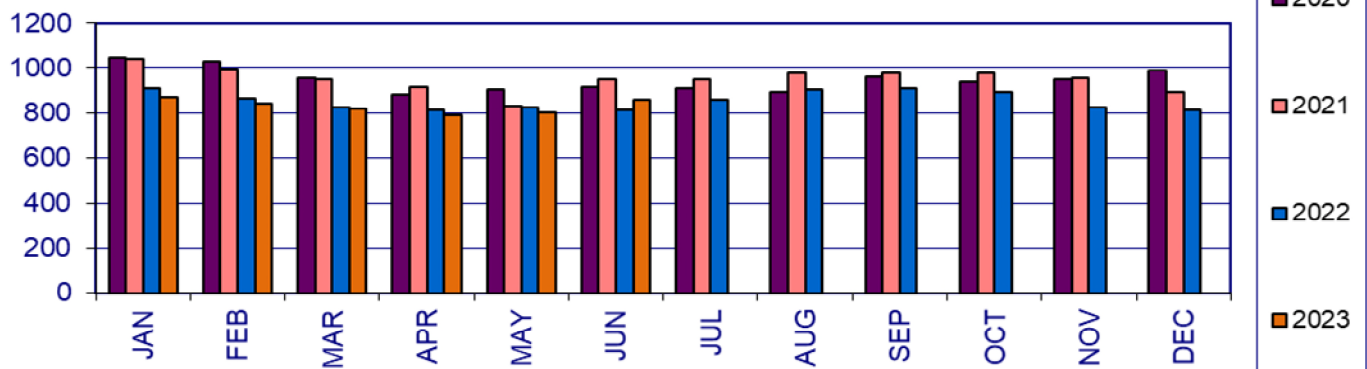

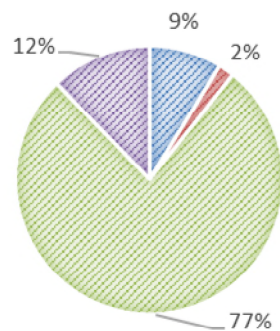

Monthly Comparison Pretrial Population



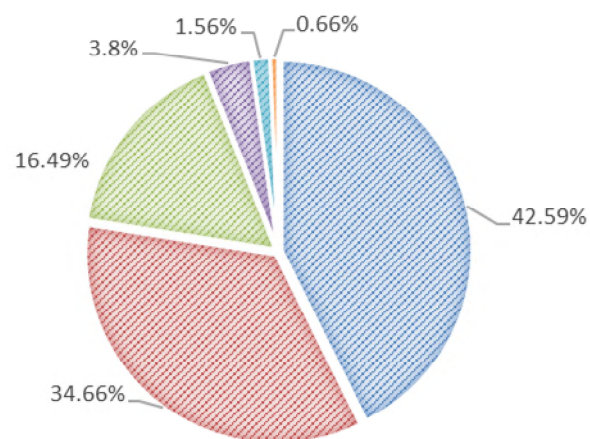

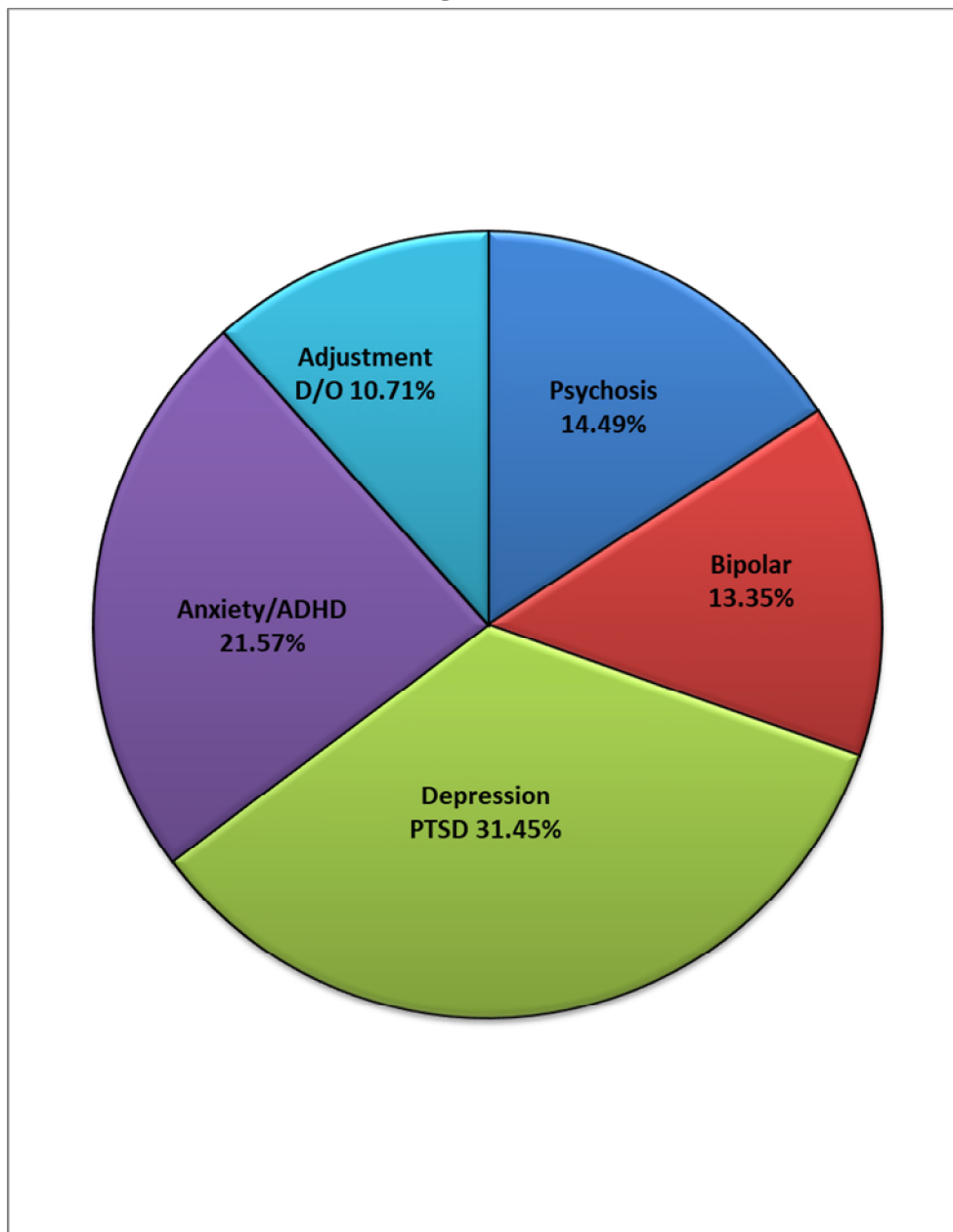

Mental Health Diagnostic Percentages May 2023



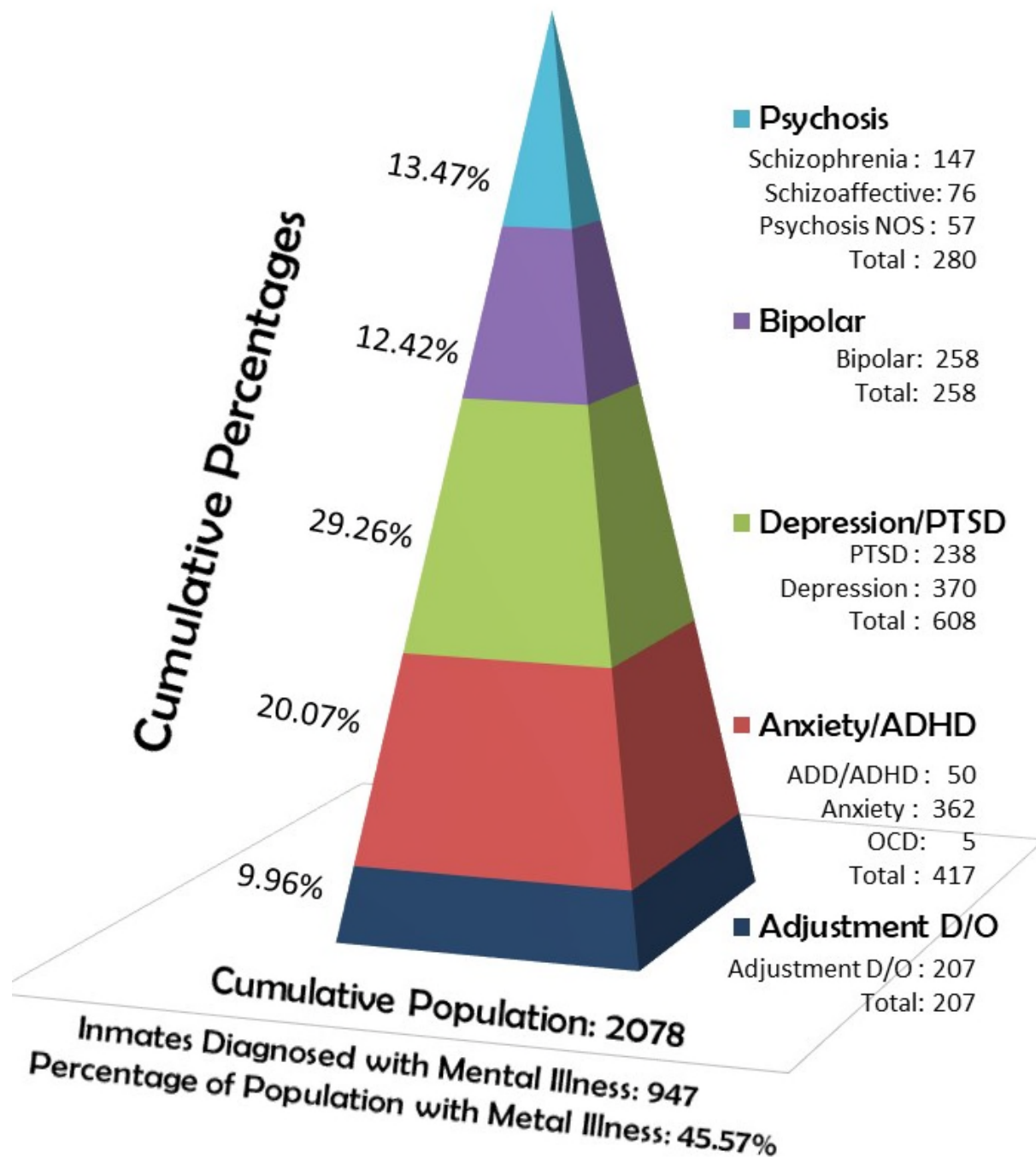

CNT – Crisis Negotiations Team

Training- Training was held on June 20th to recertify team members on the rescue phone and body cameras.

Deployments-The Crisis Negotiations Team (CNT) was called out one time during the month of June. The correctional objective was met in this deployment without force. Dates of deployment and a brief synopsis is listed below.

- 6/28/2023 – Deployed to help facilitate a cell transfer for an individual that was to be placed on suicide watch protocol. Negotiators contacted the individual and explained what was going to happen and why. Negotiators were able to de-escalate the individual to the point where they complied with instructions given by C.E.R.T.T. The two teams working in concert were able to complete the correctional objective without force or injury.

CERTT – Correctional Emergency Response Transport Team

Training: On June 22nd and 29th, CERTT members received training in executing capture team operations of use of force reviews.

Deployments: one deployment during the month of June for a cell extraction.

- 6/28/2023 -- Cell extraction on combative administrative confinement inmate to move rooms because being placed on a suicide watch. Inmate became compliant through the efforts of CERTT and CNT working together to de-escalate the situation. Inmate was moved successfully to a cell that can be more easily monitored without force. No staff injuries reported.

Training- No training held in June.

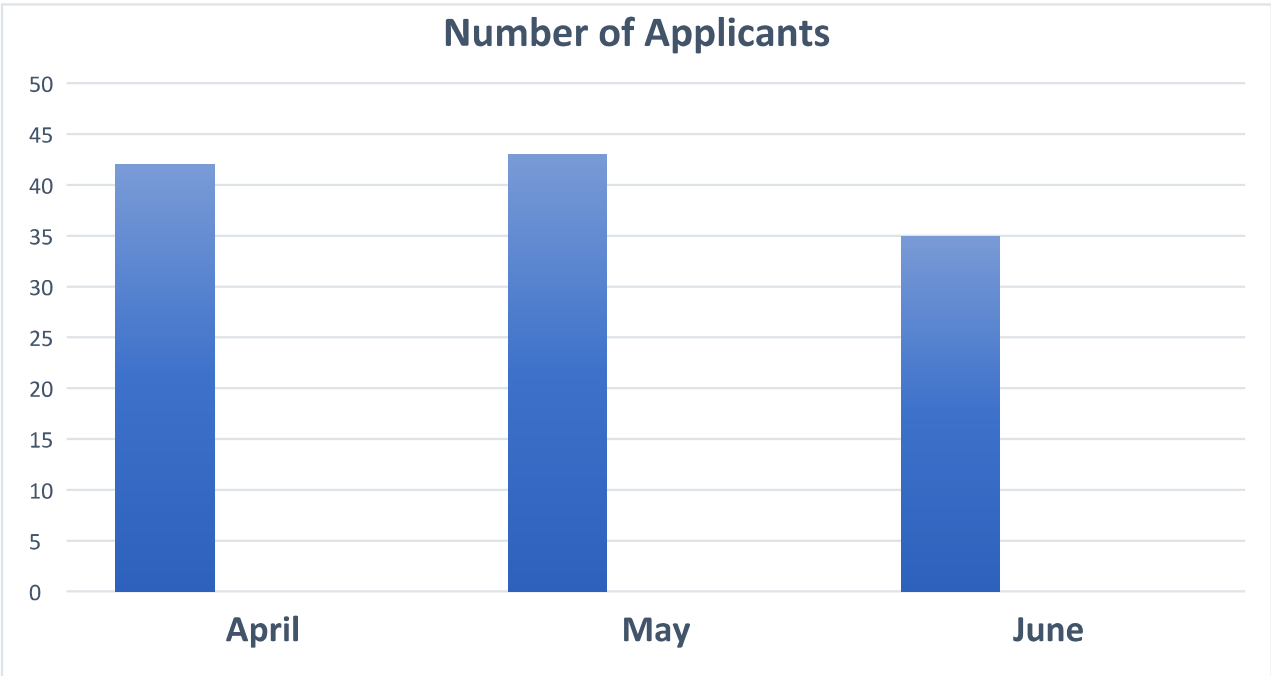
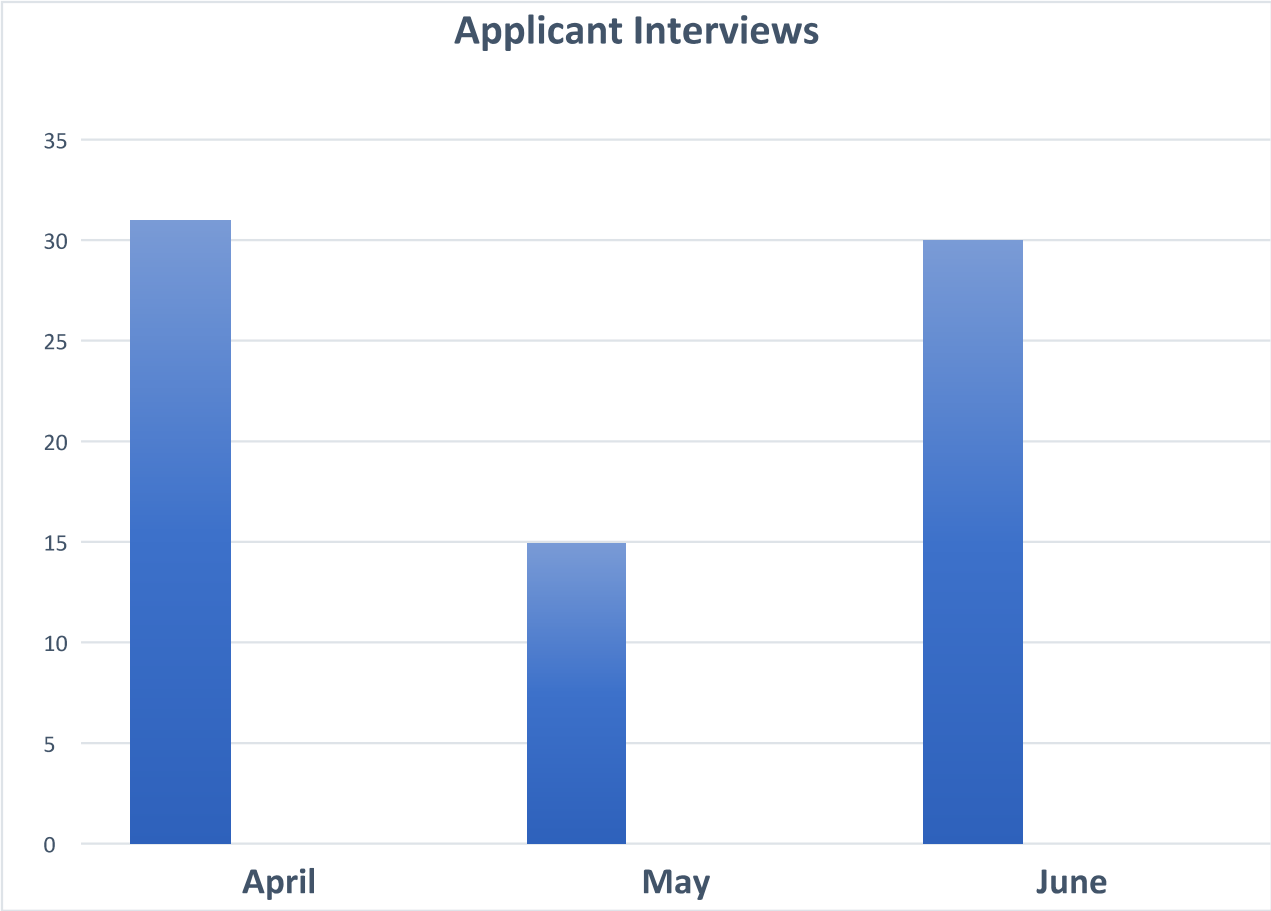
Deployments- Honor Guard was deployed two times in June.

Searches

21 unit searches were conducted during the Month of June. Items recovered were primarily modified items used for tattooing. Major contraband items recovered during these searches; multiple strikers (jail made item, usually made from radio batteries to facilitate a spark), notes on how to use a cash app. to purchase contraband, a white powdery substance (not tested as per fentanyl protocol), and a substance suspected to be K2 (testing was inconclusive).

In the month of June, 10 staff members received training to become new OC (Oleoresin Capsicum) instructors.

PPCT (defensive tactics) annual recert training has begun for all staff in the month of June.

A media campaign was launched in the month of June consisting of TV commercials and social media in anticipation for our July class.

A new hire class is set to start on July 24, 2023.

Wellness and Retention

- Eleven staff members utilized the Wellness and Retention office for assistance.
