SUBJECT: Board of Corrections Report for May, 2023

Enclosed you will find the monthly report.

• **Enclosure 1 (Administrative Services):**

- After the eleventh month of the fiscal year we are \$206,219 under budget. We have been encumbering funds allocated to safety renovations which will continue into the following fiscal year.
- \$371,796 were spent on overtime costs in May, this is a significant decrease of approximately \$480,000 from the previous month. We project overtime costs will continue to drop as our recent class of forty officers completes field training in early June.
- Over \$700,000 in bond payments were processed.

• **Enclosure 2 (Community Corrections /Reentry Services):**

- The Sanction Center and Transitional Discharge Center placed a total of sixteen individuals in Community Corrections and saved a combined 109 bed days.
- Work Release
 - Admitted 23 individuals
- House Arrest
 - House Arrest admitted 70 individuals
- Reentry Assistance Program (RAP)
 - RAP admitted 23 individuals
 - One individual achieved a GED
- Reentry Services/Therapeutic Communities
 - 63 individuals were admitted to therapeutic community housing units.
 - Two individuals achieved a GED

- Pre-trial Services
 - Full integration of data systems is in progress for the revised Pretrial Release supervision program.
 - 239 Individuals were placed on Pretrial Release
 - 900 Individuals were supervised on Pretrial Release
 - 450 Individuals participated in 24/7 Sobriety
 - 141 Individuals were supervised via GPS monitors
 - 2,948 jail bed days were saved
- Law library utilization via the tablet system continues to be strong and has increased every month.
- Of note, our Pretrial Release program can claim some credit for potentially saving a life. 911 received a call regarding a suicidal individual and law enforcement responders noted that the individual was on our GPS monitoring system. While in route, the caller reported that the suicidal individual had left the location and whereabouts were unknown. Our Pretrial Release staff were able to provide real-time location data to responding officers who located the person in distress and took that person to a hospital for psychiatric care.
- **Enclosure 3 (ACA, NCCHC, PREA - Compliance)**
 - Preparation for our upcoming American Correctional Association audit is ramping up. Between the Jail and Community Corrections we have a total of 634 standards that we will demonstrate compliance with. The audit is scheduled for October 30th–November 3rd. Our accreditation hearing will take place at the ACA winter conference in Washington, DC in January, 2024.
- **Enclosure 4 (Personnel)**
 - Nine officers below the rank of Sergeant left employment in May, most of those consisted of individuals who did not successfully complete training. We do have a handful of upcoming departures from officers who are leaving Corrections to pursue careers in law enforcement.
 - Forty officers graduated in the Legislative Chambers on May 26th. They will complete two weeks of field-training.
 - As of May 31st, we were 101% staffed. Following a two month period to allow for veteran staff to go through training for various recertification. We plan to have another training academy to begin in late July in order to maintain current staffing levels.
- **Enclosure 5 (Population)**

- Inmates were sent out twenty-nine times for emergent medical care. Fifteen of those were by 911. There were ten hospital admissions, which resulted in fifty days of hospitalization.
- There were 33 offsite specialty medical appointments.
- Covid vaccine clinics continued to be offered regularly to the incarcerated population. However, due to the expiration of the public health emergency our supply of vaccines will be depleted soon. We will await further guidance on how vaccine will be distributed and administered going forward.

- **Enclosure 8 (Security Operations & Honor Guard)**

- Crisis Negotiation Team (CNT)
 - There was one deployment, which resulted in a successful de-escalation and attendance to court without force being required.
- Correctional Emergency Response & Transport Team (CERTT)
 - There were three deployments for a cell extractions which were completed with no or minimal force required.
 - The CERTT team provided security at the AJA conference.
- Searches
 - Eight searches of housing units were conducted. Contraband recovered included marijuana, modified items for tattooing, a crushed pill, and suspected K-2.
- Honor Guard
 - Provided service to the AJA conference and the DCDC Corrections Week memorial ceremony.

- **Other noteworthy items**

- Work on the facility-wide safety project continues. When concluded, all housing units with a top tier will have safety netting installed and top bunks are being replaced. The male and female infirmaries have been temporarily relocated to housing units where the project has been completed. Renovation of the infirmaries is largely completed, however the safety netting has been delayed in arriving. This project will continue throughout much of the balance of 2023.
- Lastly, we hosted a very successful American Jail Association conference May 20-24 at the CHI Convention Center. We will prepare a visual presentation for the next board meeting but among the highlights were:

- Attendance was one of the highest ever with 44 states and at least four foreign nations represented.
- Vendor space in the exhibition hall was 100% sold out with positive reviews from vendors about the success they experienced during the conference.
- The head of the Philippines correctional system and some of his chief staff members were given a private tour of our jail tailored to their specific areas of interest.
- The Director and Deputy Director for the National Institute of Corrections were present and given a private tour. NIC will be featuring Douglas County in forthcoming publications after learning of our rehabilitative programming.
- Our staff and facilities received rave reviews from hundreds of individuals who signed up for tours during the conference. Many said they had never seen a jail as clean or staff as friendly or professional as they saw here.
- Overall the conference received rave reviews as one of the more smoothly and professionally operated that AJA has ever held. Attendees consistently complimented our community and the area surrounding the convention center and downtown. AJA board members indicated that they are interested in having Douglas County host again in the coming years.
- I am grateful to all of our staff who made this event possible. There were many hours of preparation and planning as well as on the spot problem-solving and an accommodation of special requests. Several of our staff also presented educational workshops to packed rooms. Hosting the American Jail Association national conference was an amazing honor and we should all be proud of the display Douglas County put forth.

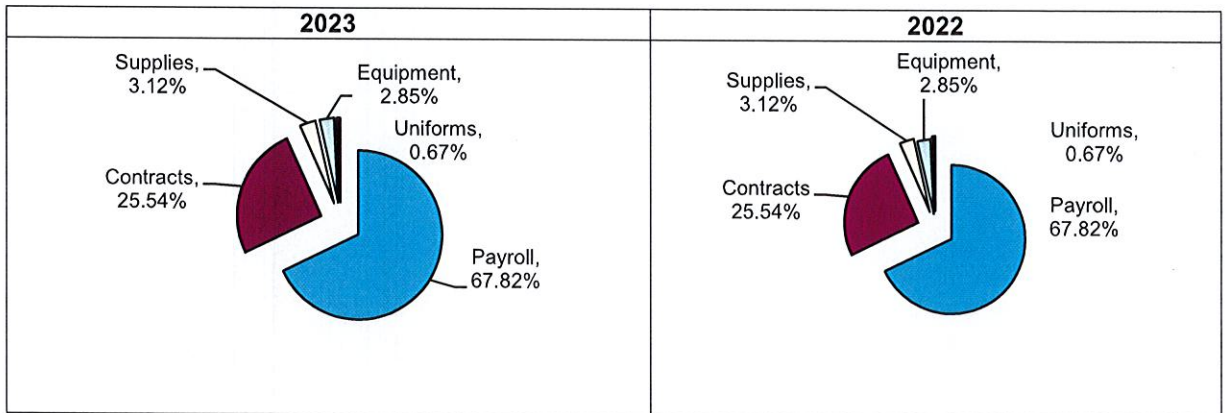
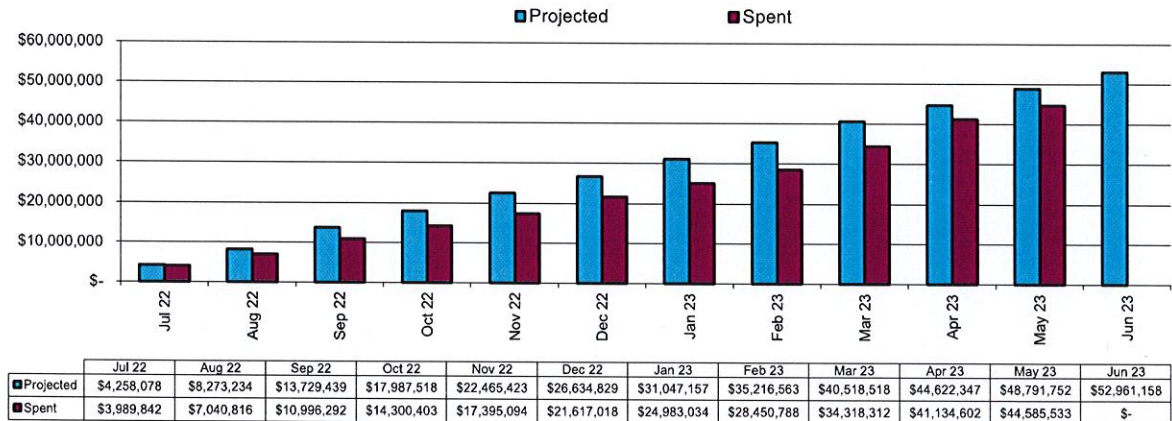
BACKGROUND: Having completed the eleventh month (May 2023) of the budget year July 2022-June 2023, the following is a summary of our budget and staffing:

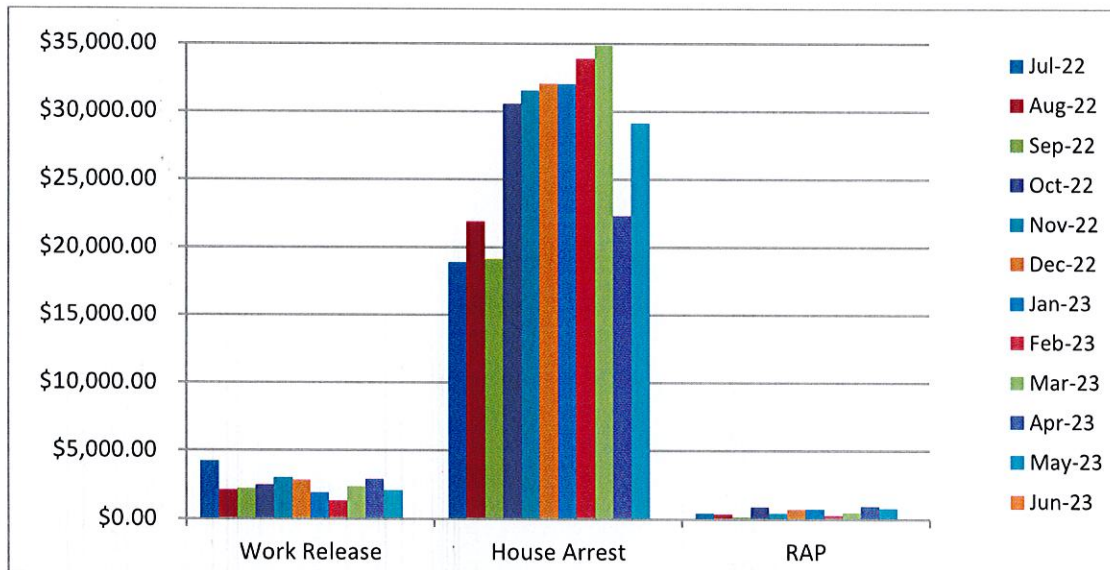




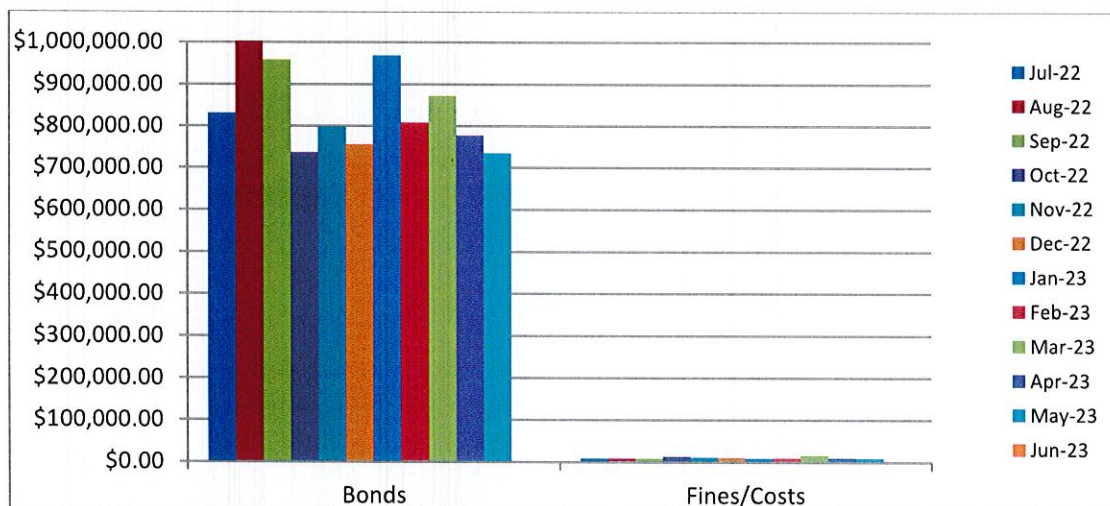


AREA: Inmate Accounts and Services

The following graph shows the total Bonds/Fines and Costs collected for incarcerated individuals:

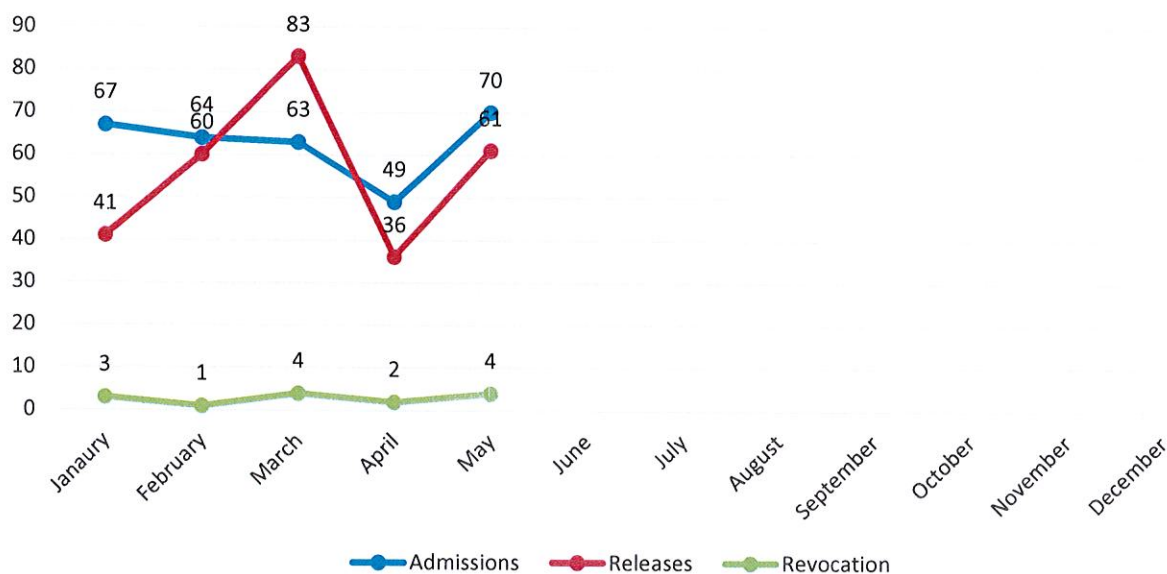

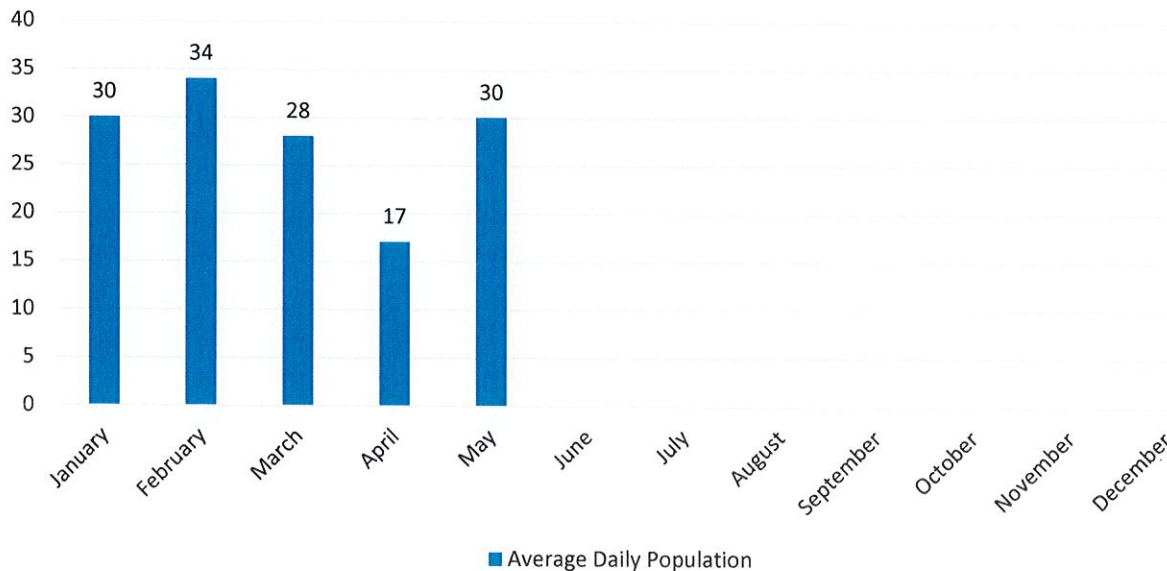

Average Daily Population



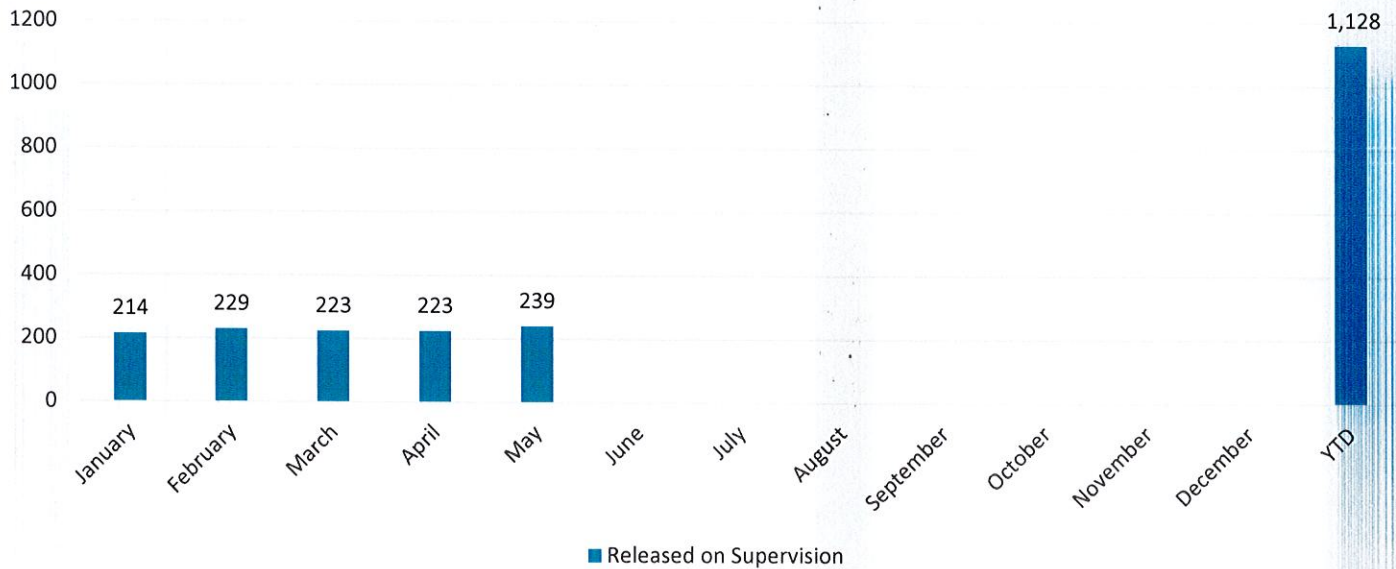

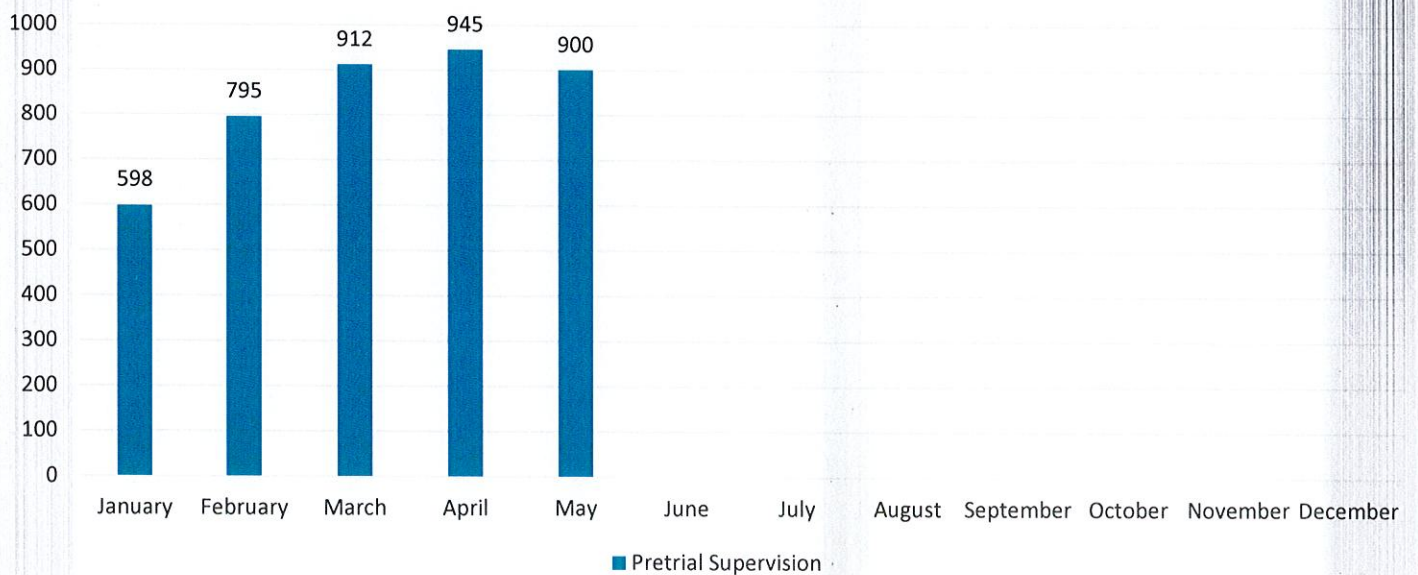

Number of Individuals Released to Pretrial Supervision

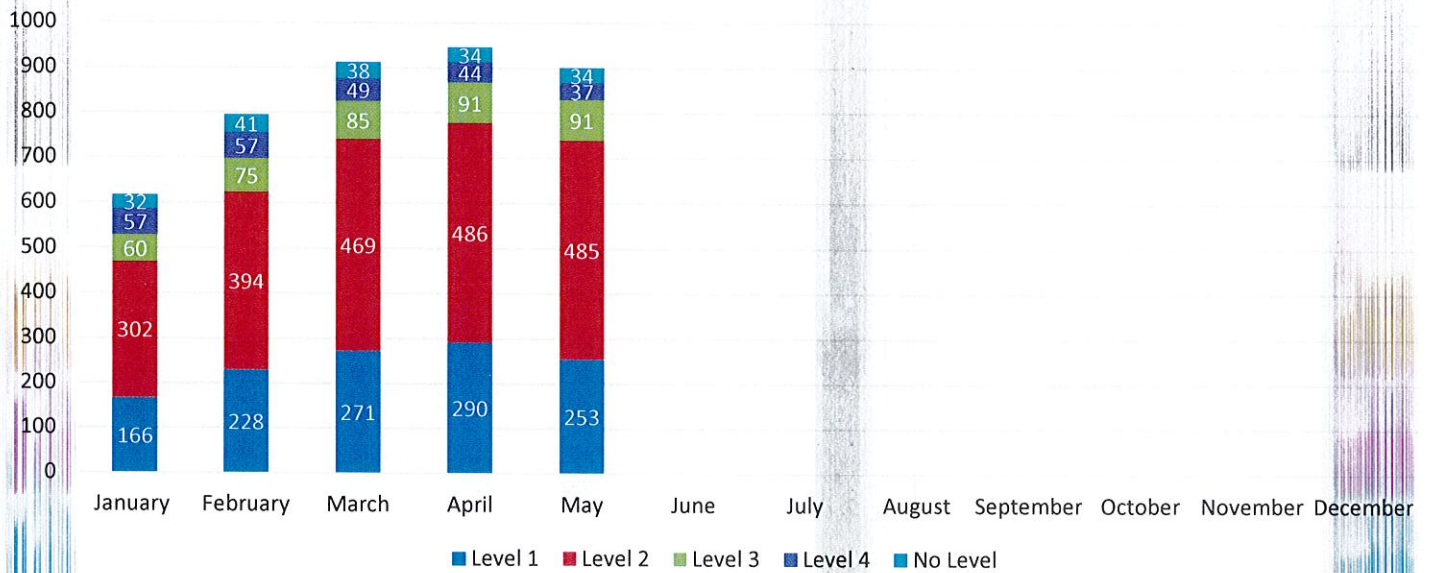

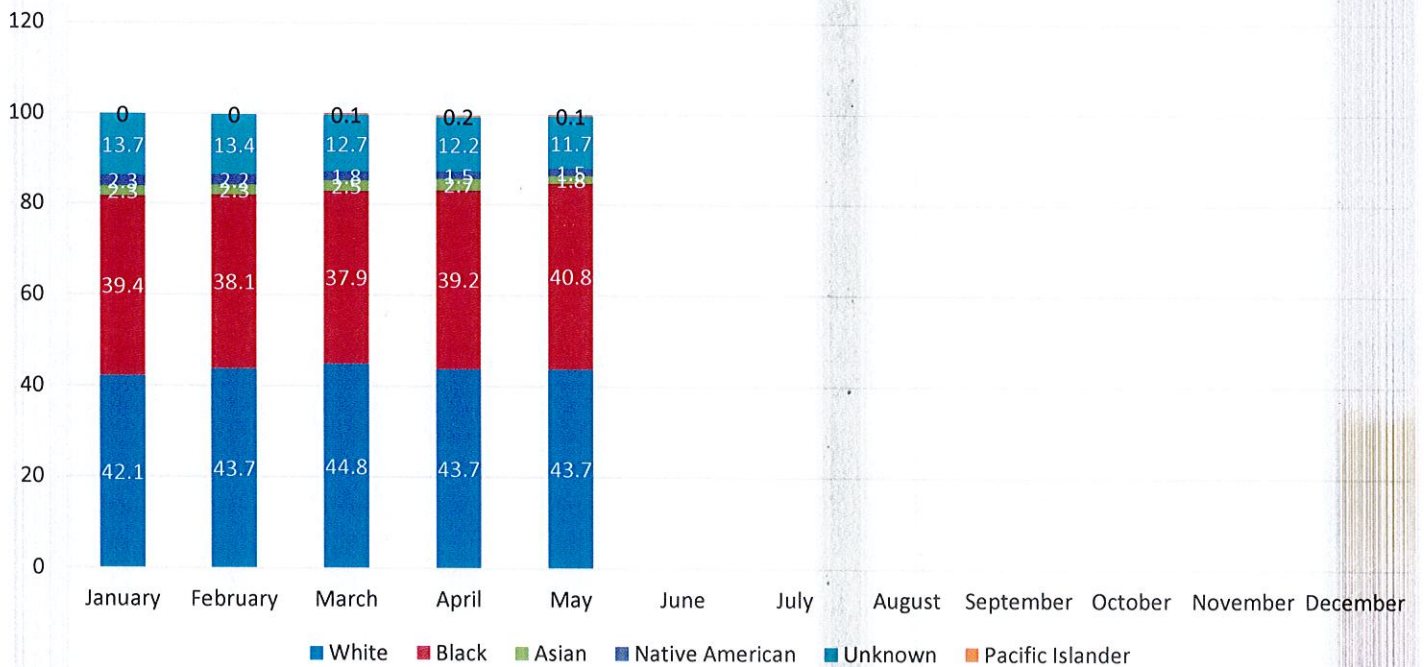
Total Number of Individuals Supervised on Pretrial Release



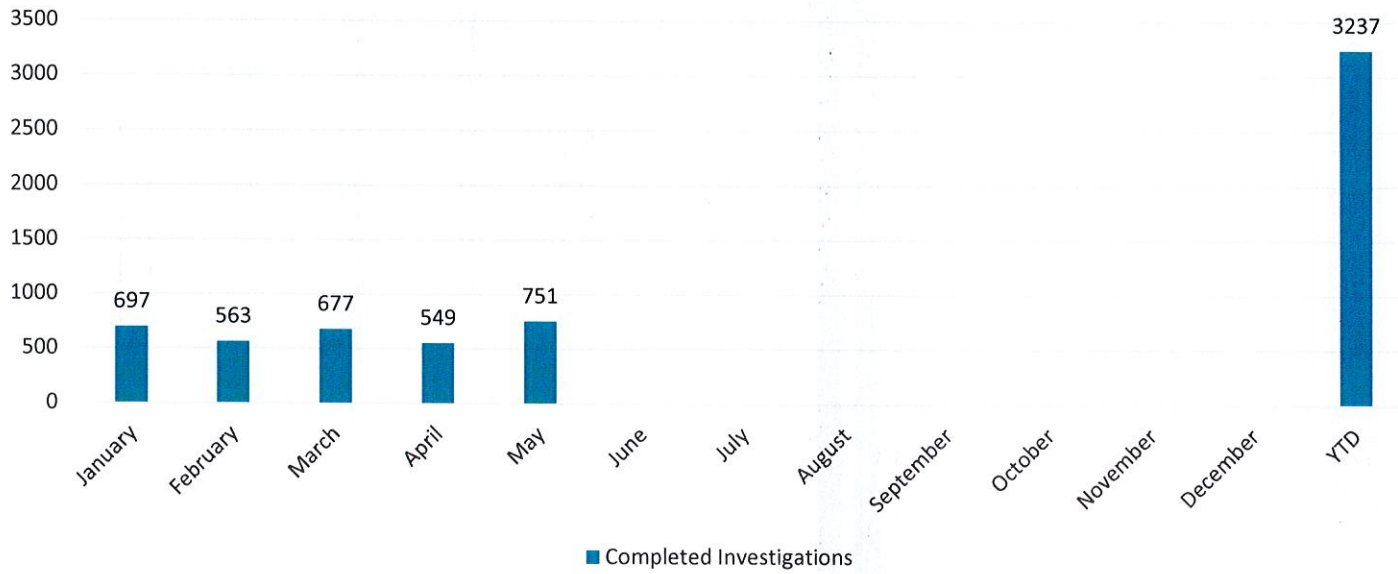
Number of Individuals Supervised by Supervision Level



Percentage of Individuals Supervised on Pretrial Release by Race

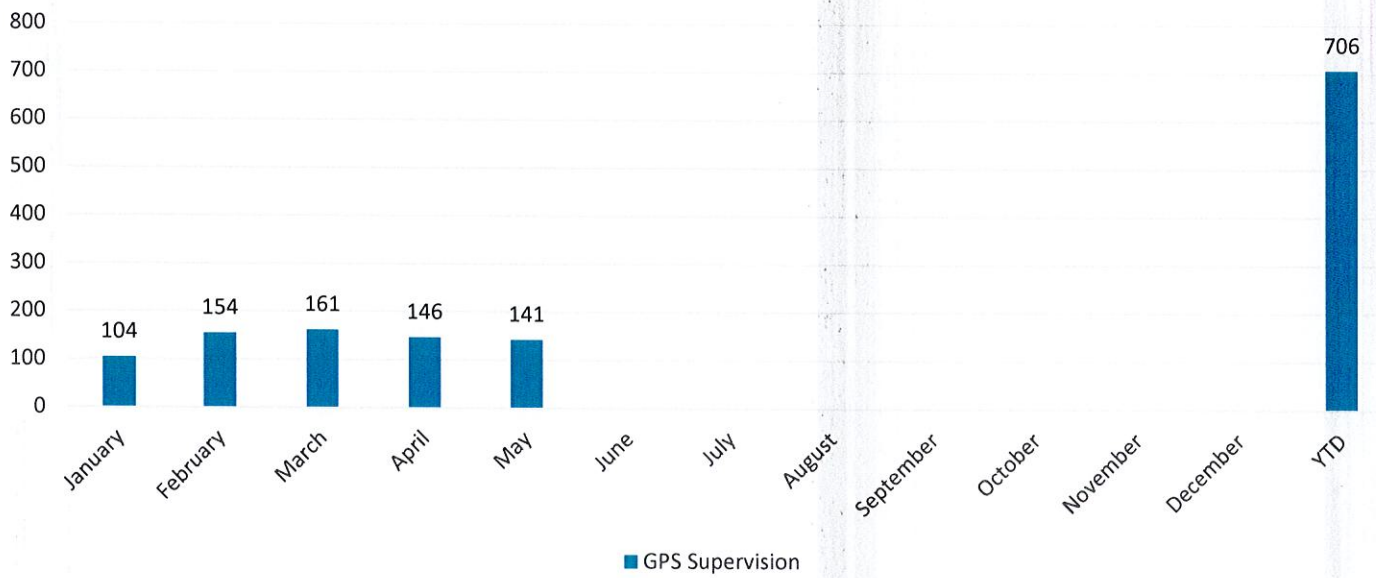

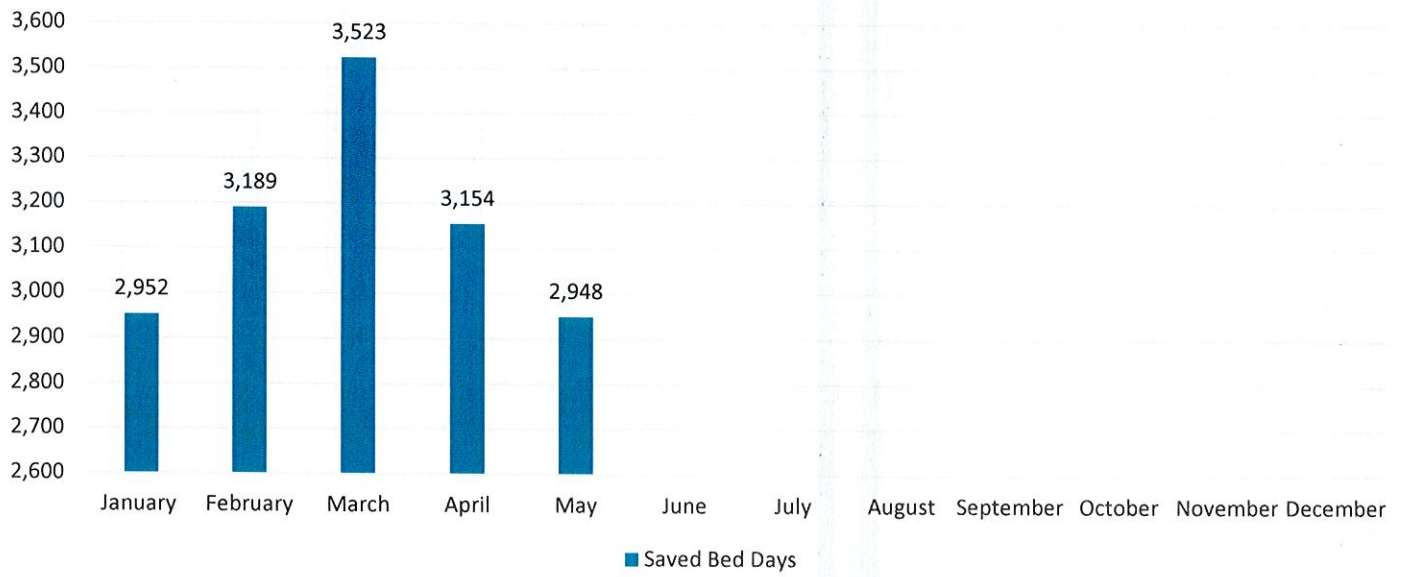


Number of Individuals who were reviewed for Pretrial Release Supervision

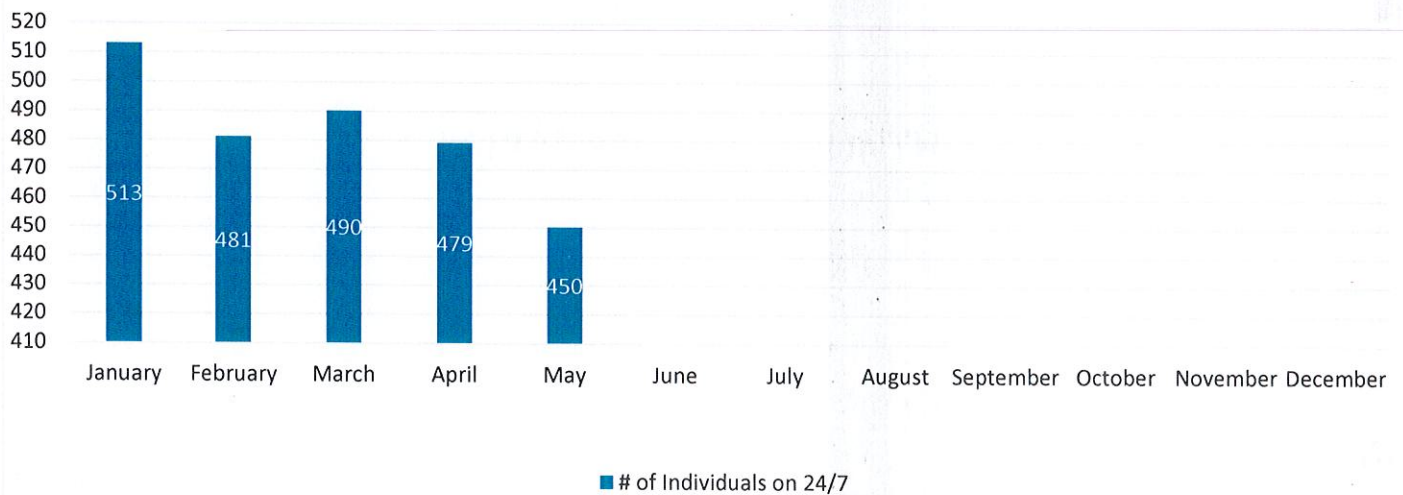
Number of Individuals on Pretrial Release GPS



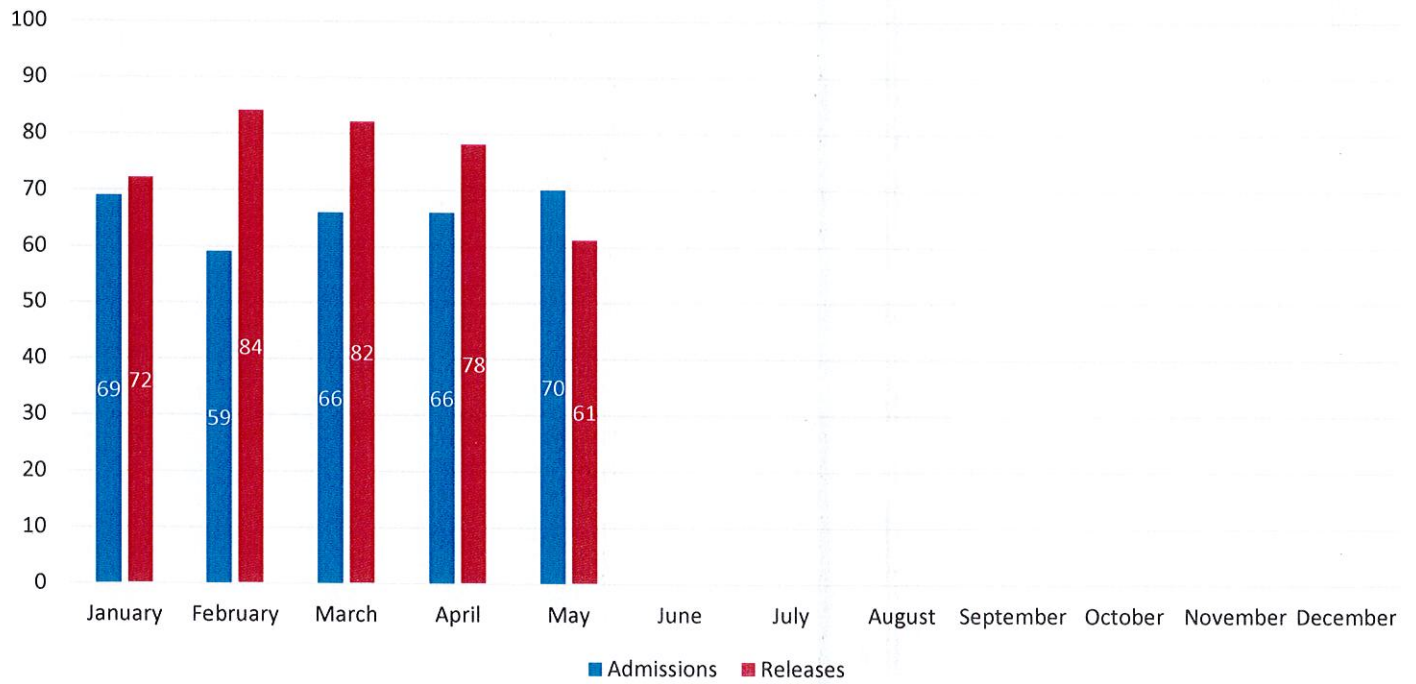
Bed Days Saved by Pretrial GPS



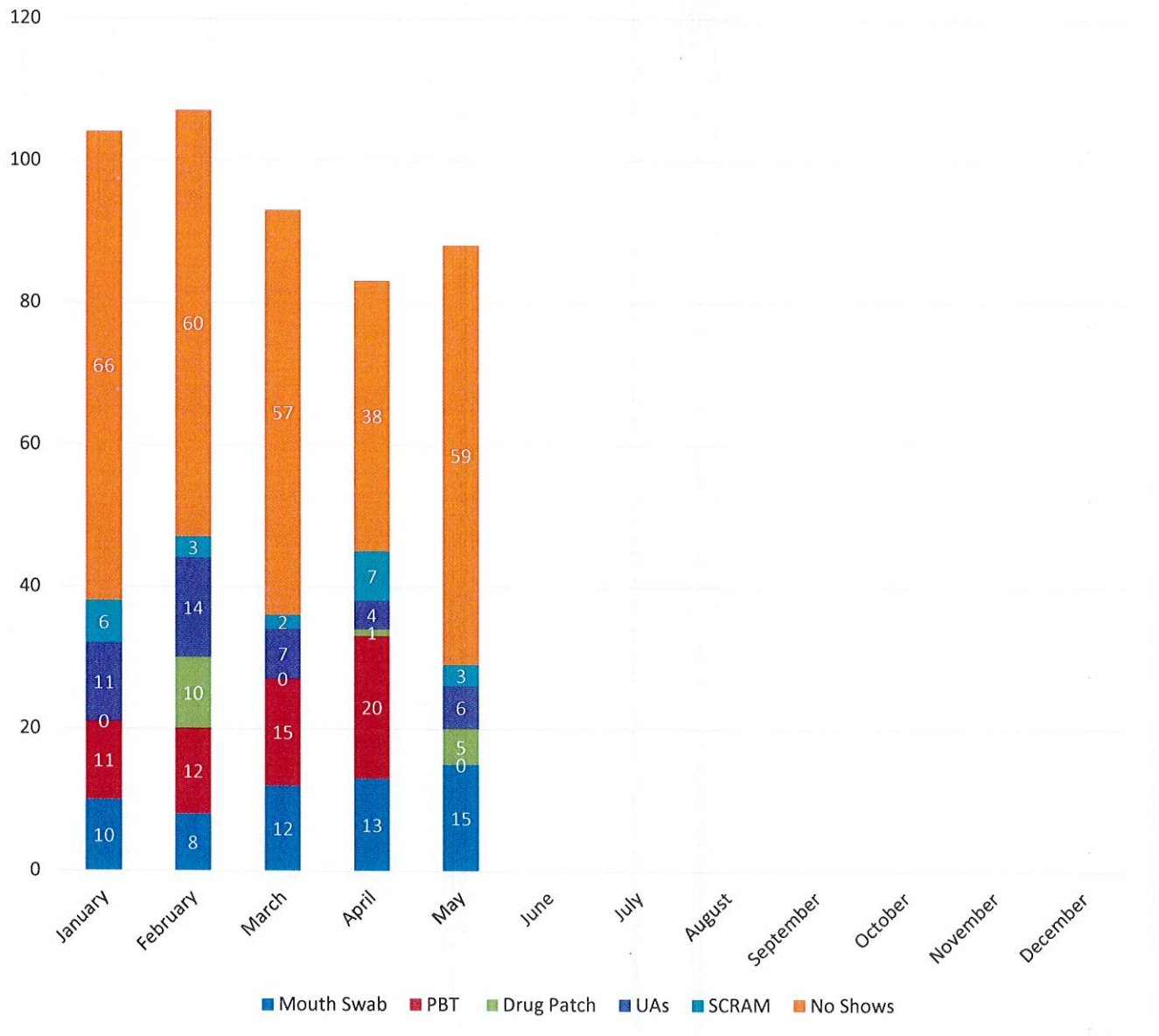
Number of Individuals on 24/7 Sobriety

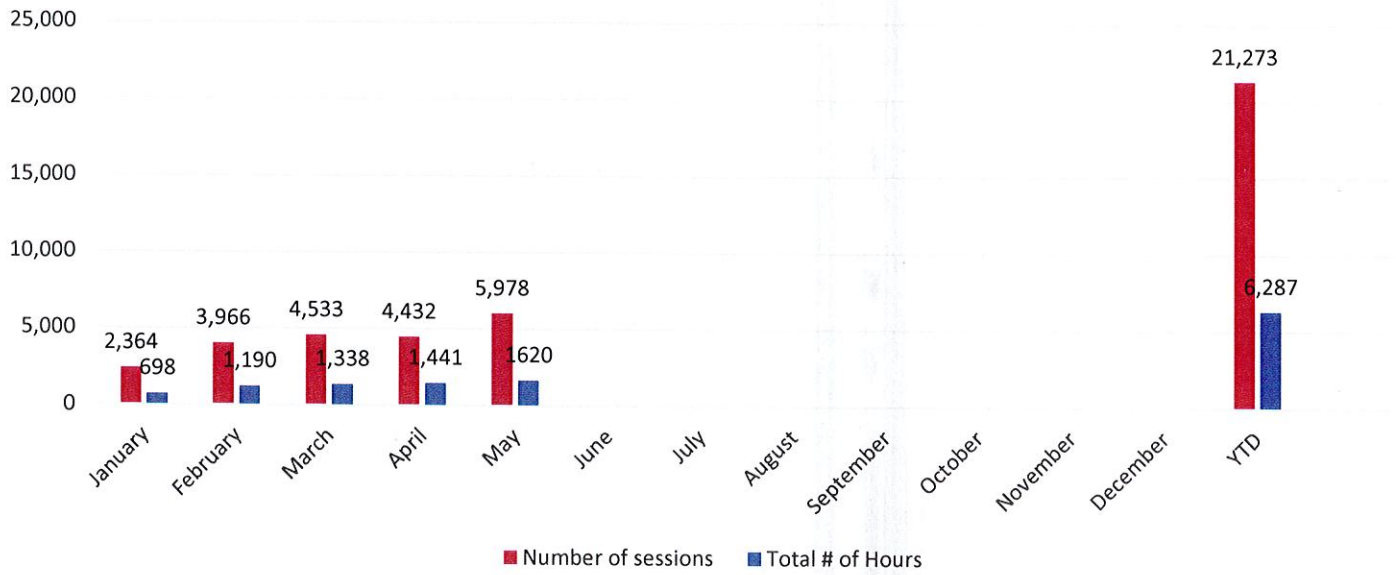

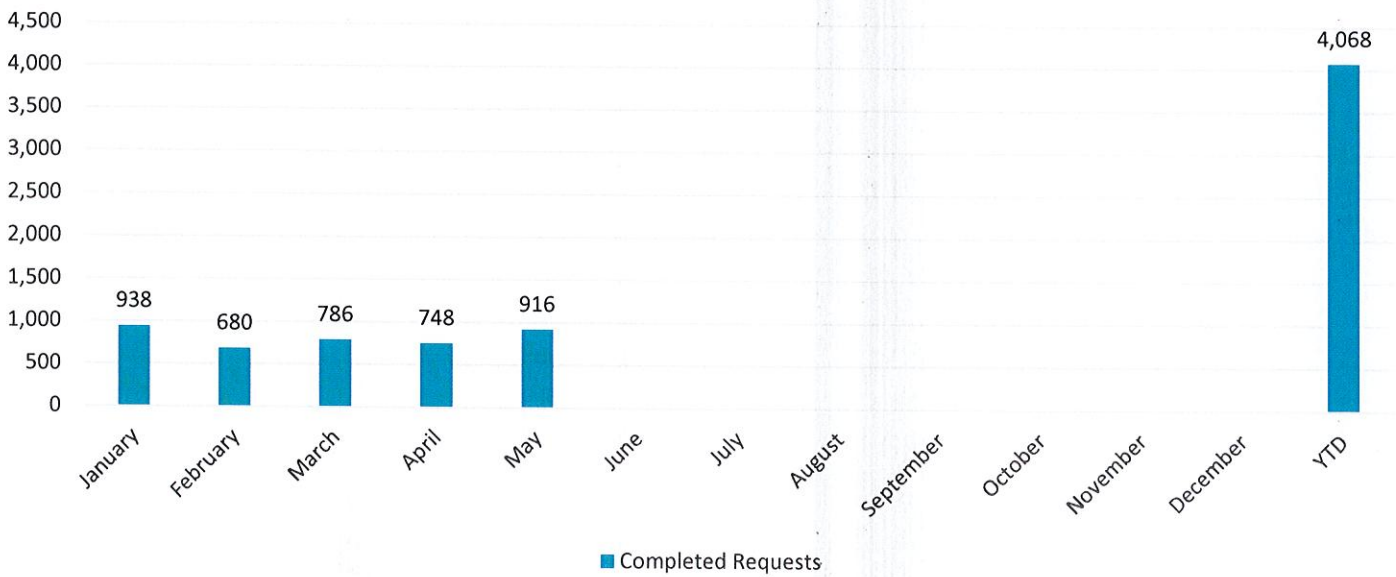

Law Library Usage on the Tablets

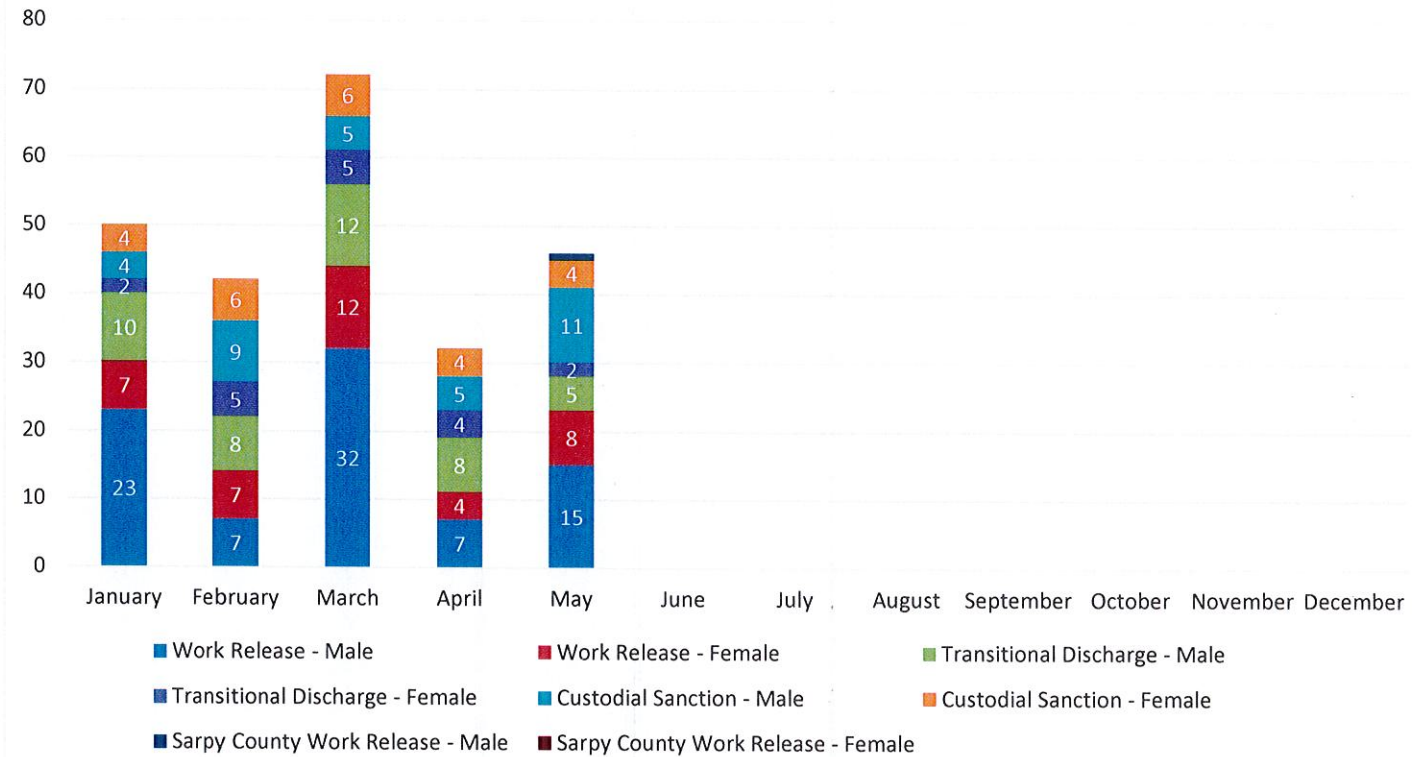


Completed Law Library Requests on Inmate Tablet



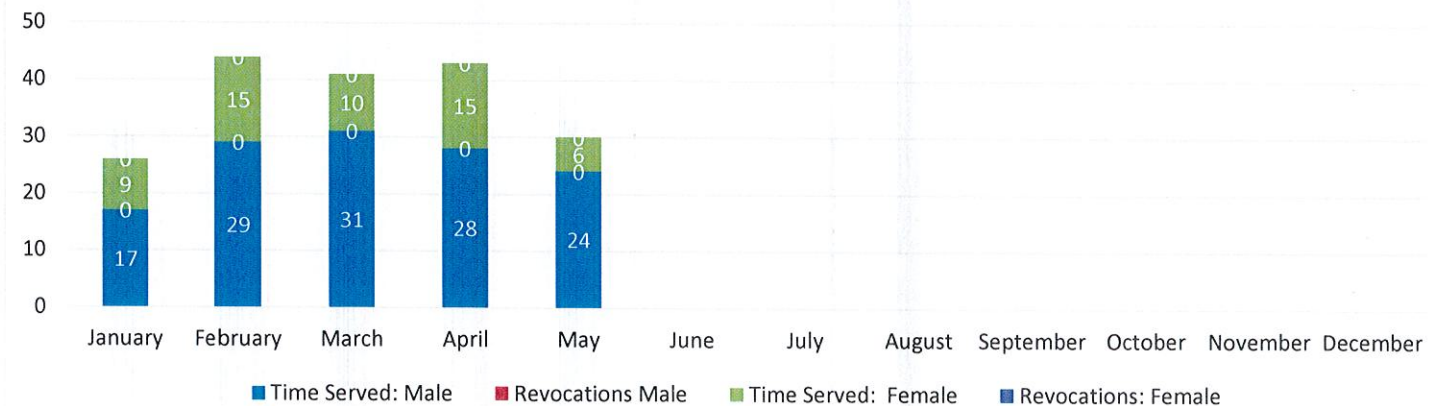

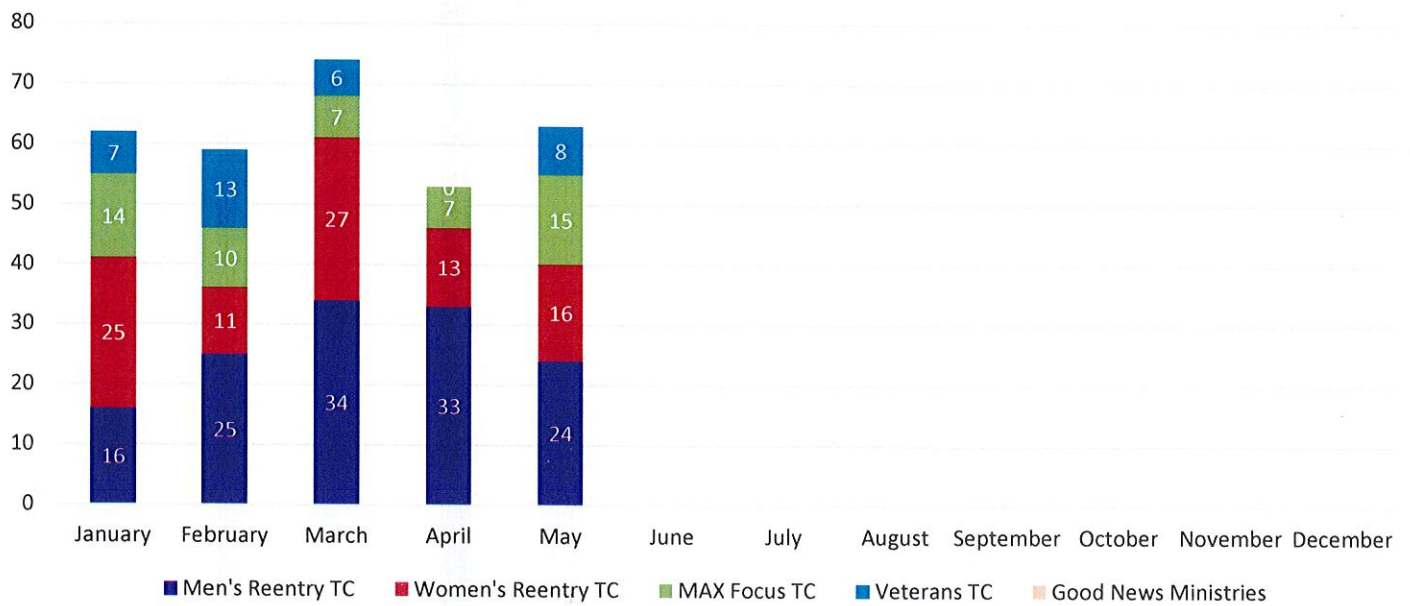
- **Reentry Services**

 - Number SUD evaluations completed in May: 28
 - Number currently on wait list for Region Six funded* evaluation: 9
 - Number on wait list for non-Region funded (due to Medicaid status): 10

*Region Six provides evaluations for individuals who have no insurance or resources to pay for an evaluation and who reside in the Region Six area; those who have active Medicaid are ineligible for Region Six funding. It is noted, community providers will not accept Medicaid referrals from jail due to the incarcerated status making individuals "ineligible for Medicaid".

DCDC provides multiple structured classes to individuals in Therapeutic Communities. See attached activity calendar for April.

- DCDC has multiple volunteers providing the following support groups weekly to individuals in custody: AA, NA, Al-Anon, CA, Peer Support
- In May, DCDC collaborated with Charles Drew to initiate Inside Out Dad parenting class for men.
- In June, DCDC will initiate another men's parenting class with Lutheran Family Services, Nurturing Fathers.
- DCDC has been completing a review of current classes offered. Class types and opportunities will be adjusted based on current population needs.

- Literacy Services are provided by Learning for All
- Trade Certifications are issued by the Nebraska Safety Council (Forklift Certification)
- Writing Group is facilitated by the Educational Services Supervisor
- DCDC was able to get testing accommodations for three clients.
- Currently one GED participant is in restricted housing.
- Arrangements were made for two individuals to participate in a high school credit recovery program.
- Educational Supervisor arranged for a student being held at Saunders County jail to continue working on their GED.
- Currently utilizing nine GED tutors
- Two Spanish speaking individuals are participating in GED with the assistance of a translator.
- Education Services continues involving individuals in custody in the development of a monthly facility wide newsletter.

BACKGROUND: We continue to collect census data.

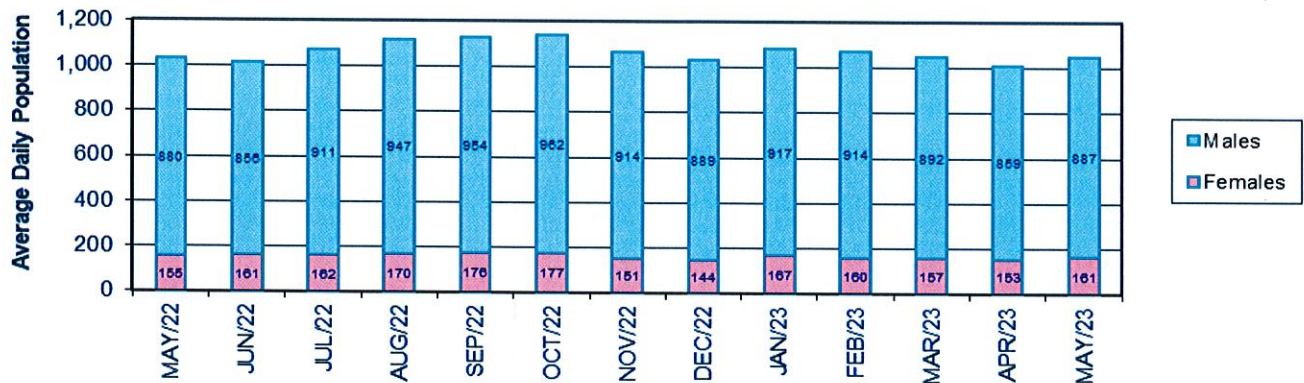
DISCUSSION: This month the average population has increased and is consistent with prior year trends. The average population for the month was 1048. Our low was 981 on the 2nd. With a high of 1105 on the 29th. U.S. Marshal Population increased this month. Felony pre-trial population increased and the percentage of the population increased. The female population increased this month and is consistent with prior year trends. The high female population was 175 on the 29th. The low was 145 on the 4th. Total admissions for the month were 1347 and 1289 were released from custody. Custodial Sanction days served this month was 87 bed days.

Community Corrections – Community Corrections continues to play a strategic role in helping keep the jail population down. Work Release decreased, while Reentry Assistance Program and House Arrest populations increased this month.

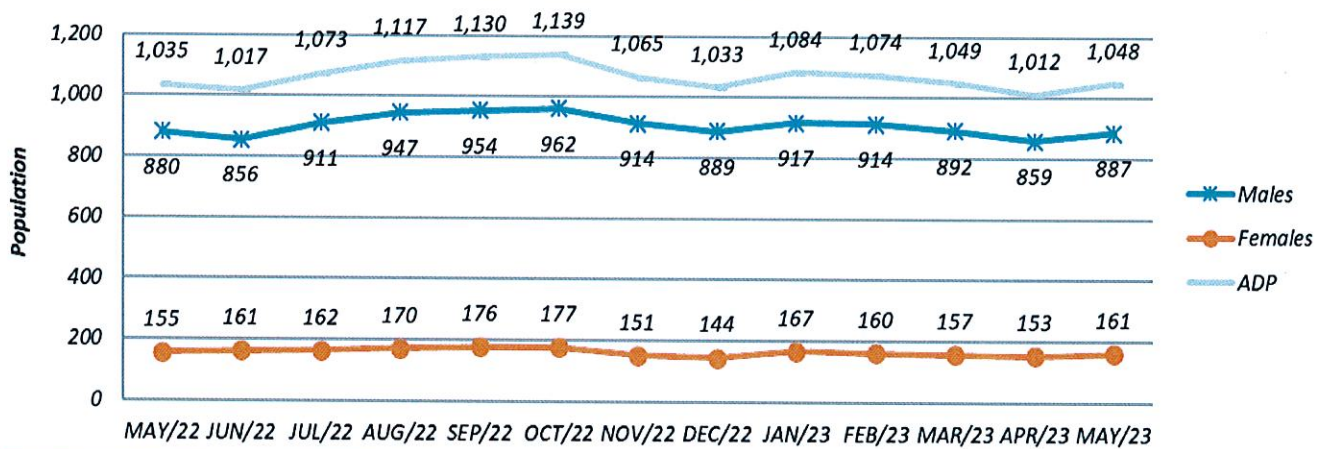

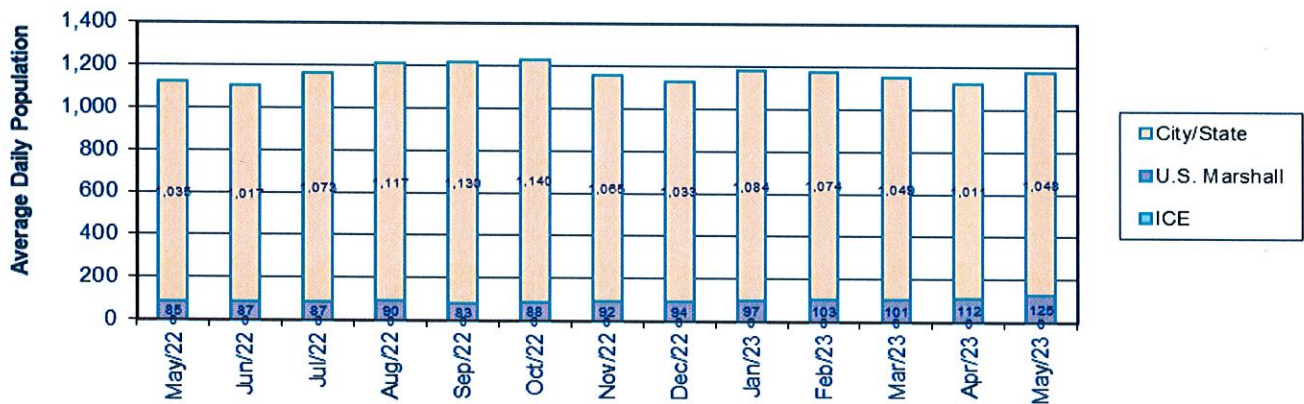

Population History

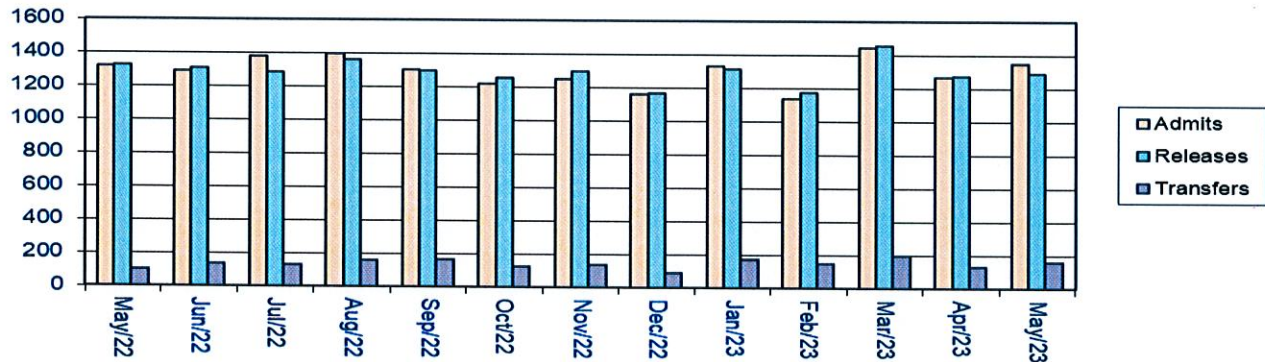


Correctional Center Contract

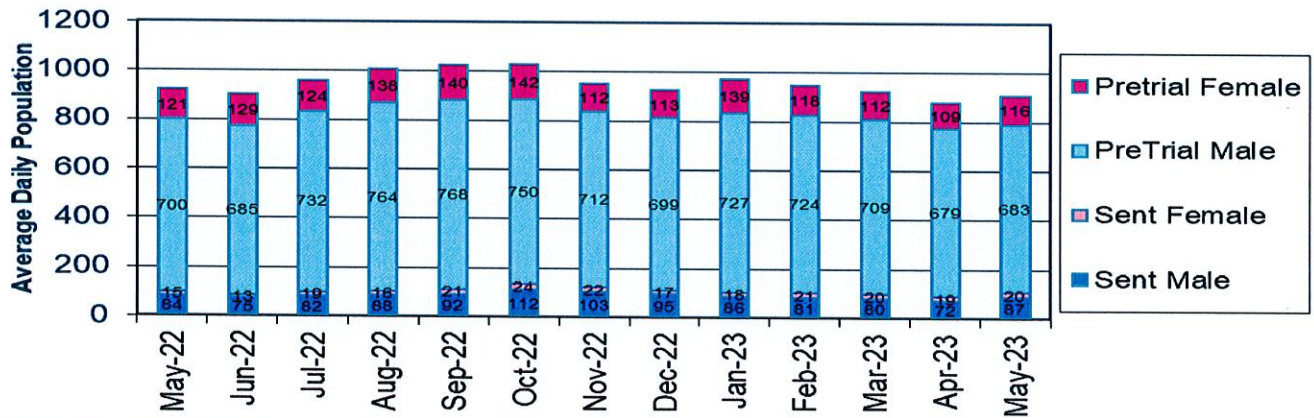

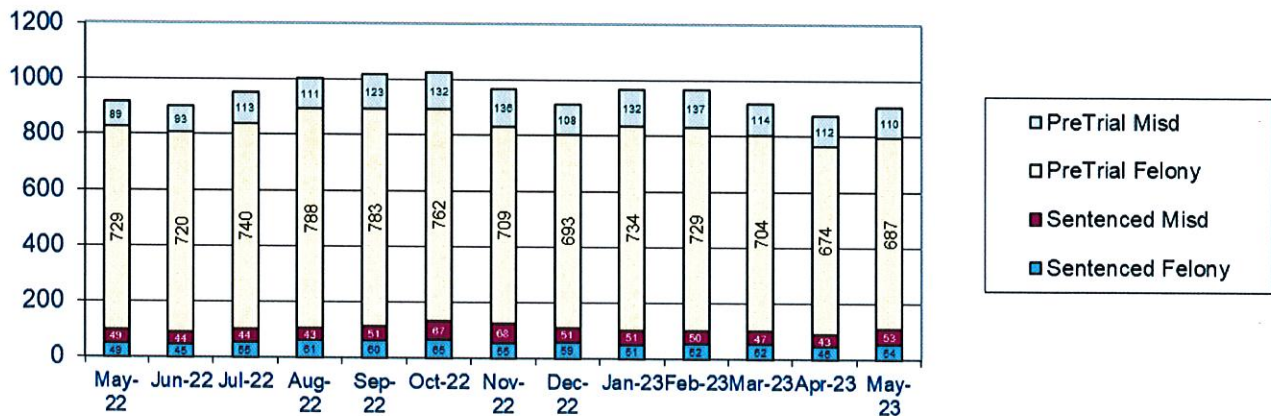
Monthly Admissions & Releases



Monthly Corrections Sentenced/Pretrial

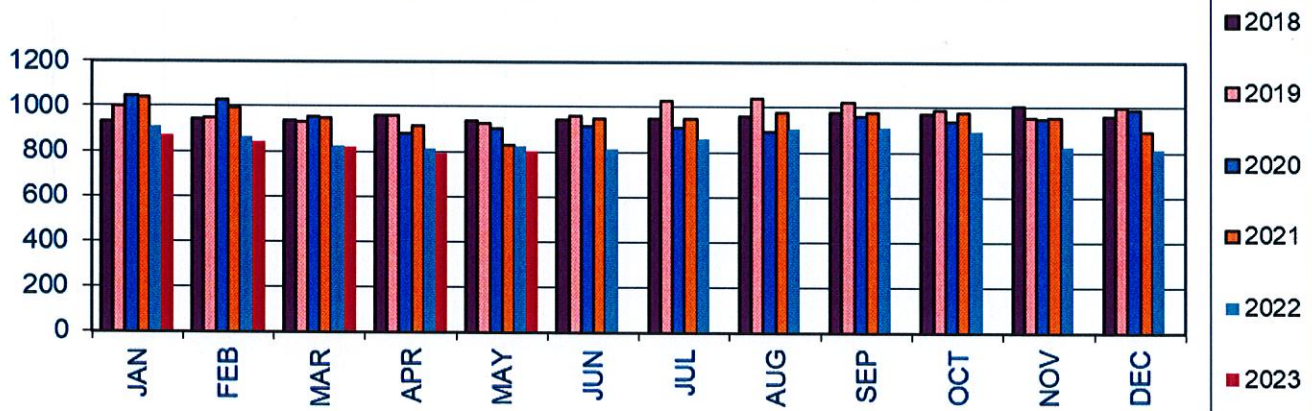


Average Felony & Misdemeanor Jail Population

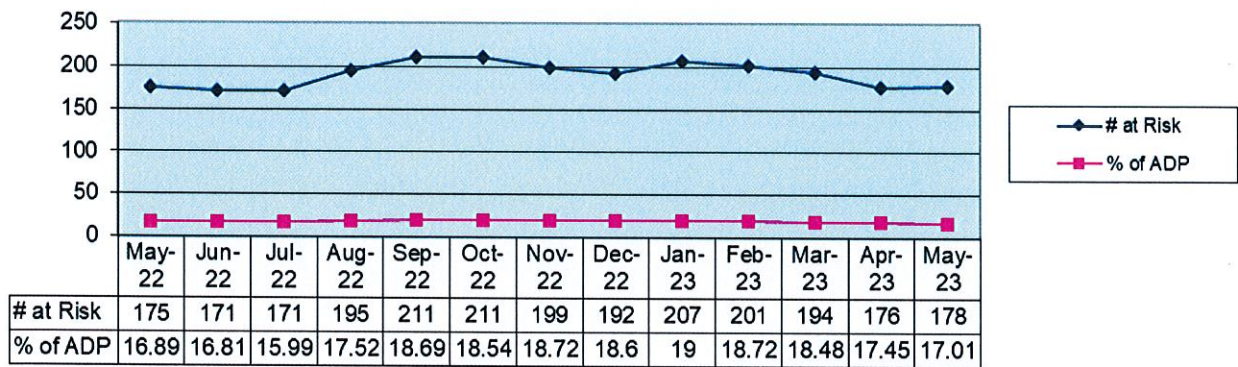

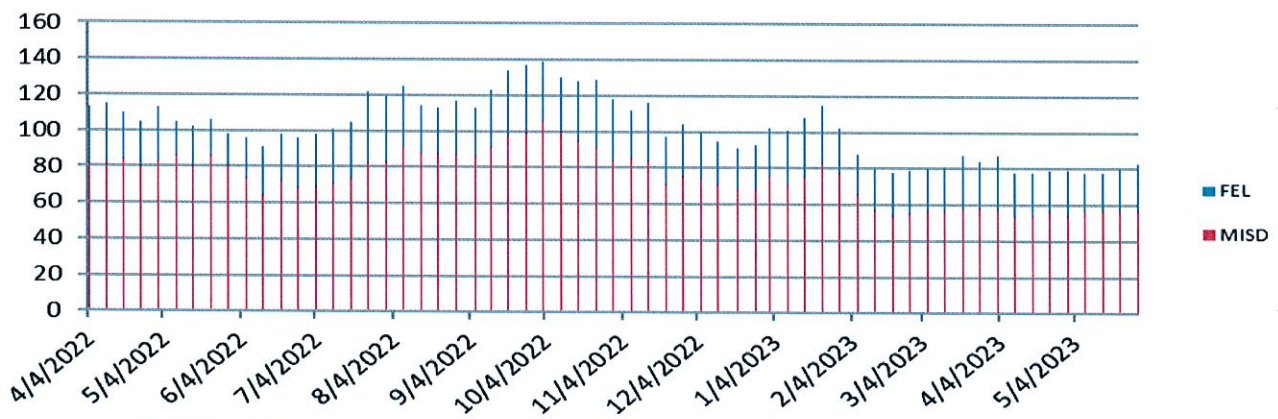
Monthly Comparison Pretrial Population

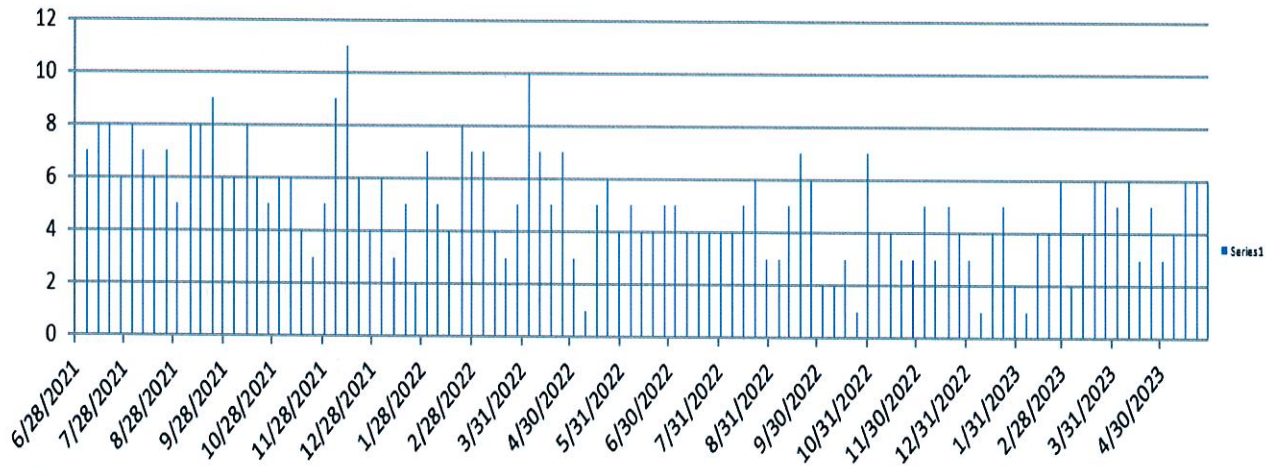

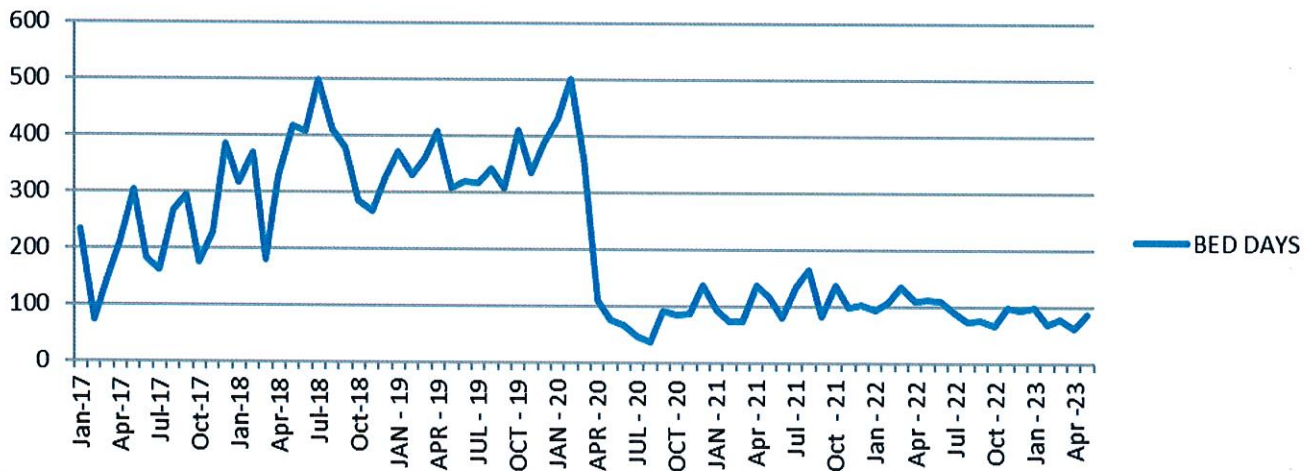

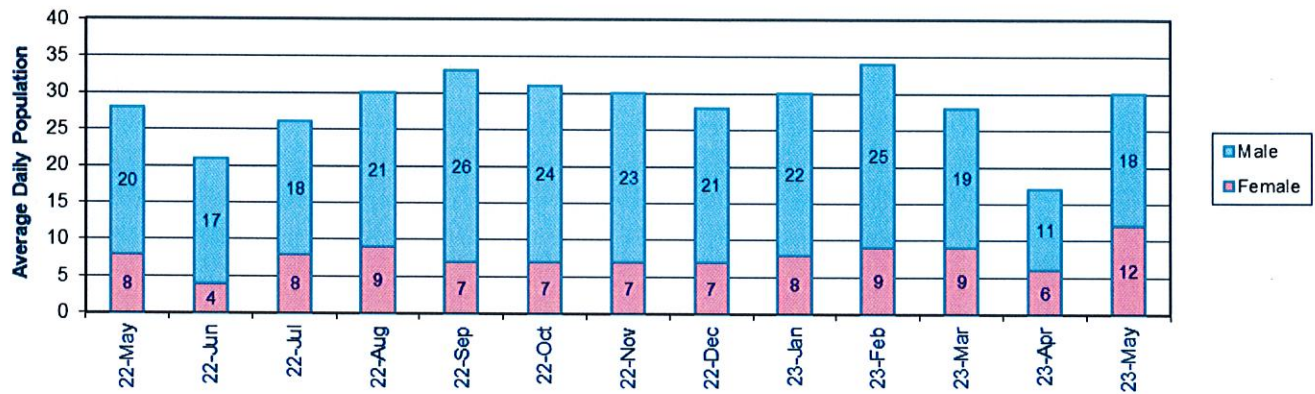


CUSTODIAL SANCTION BED DAYS 2017-2023

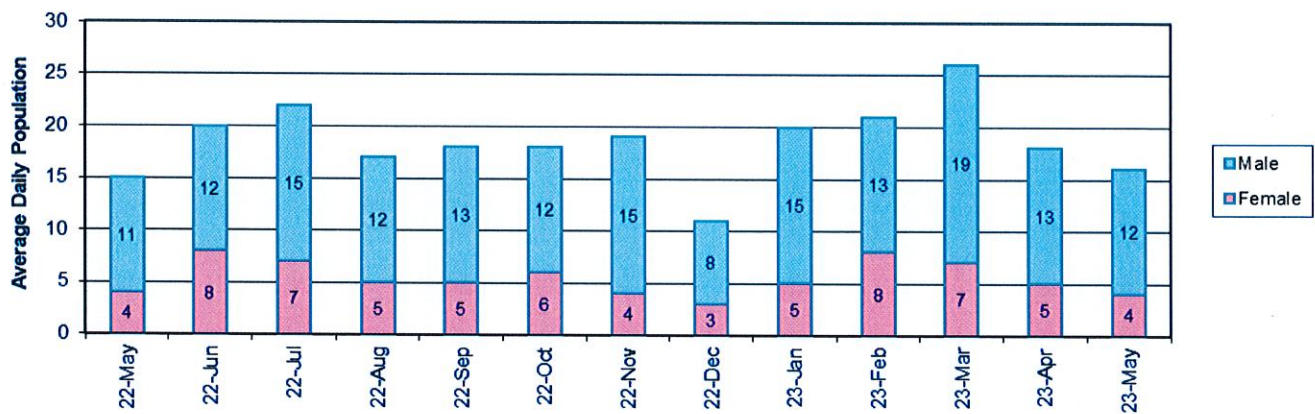

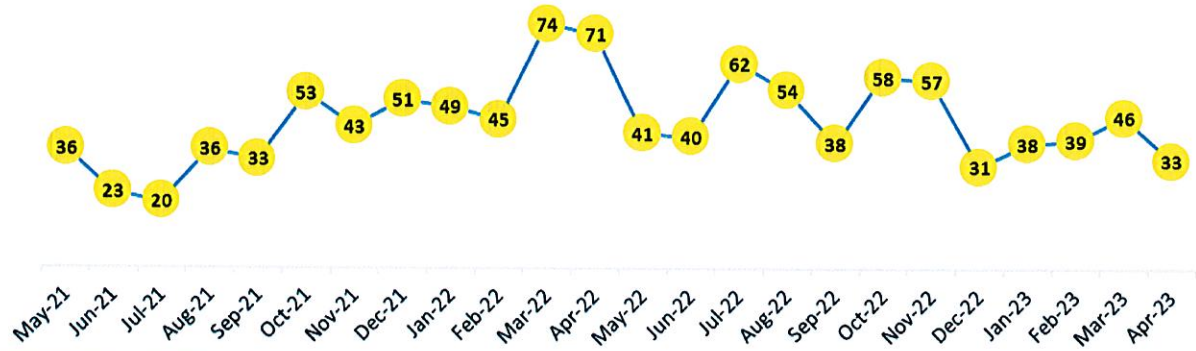

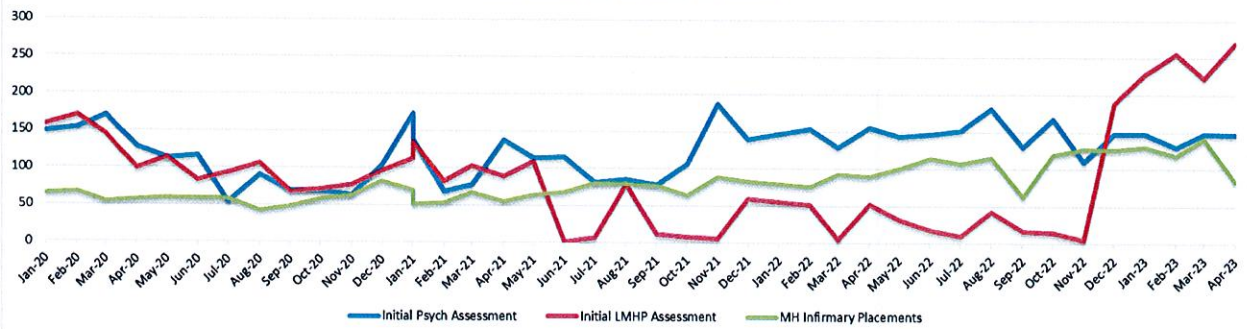

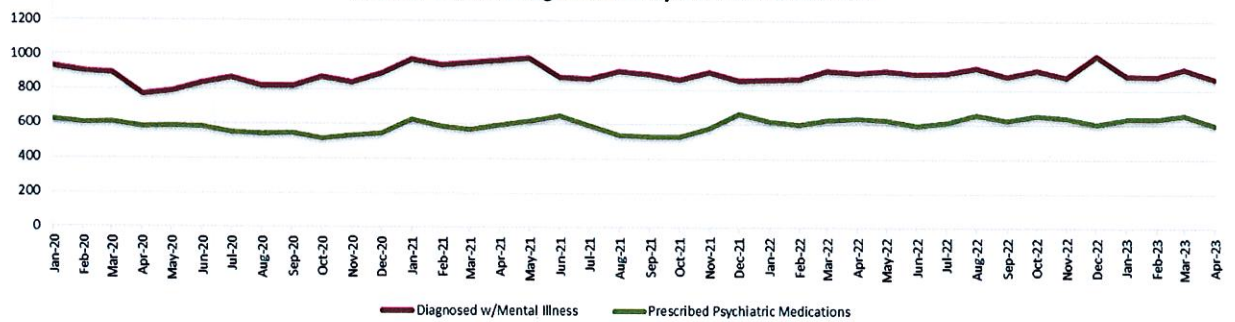

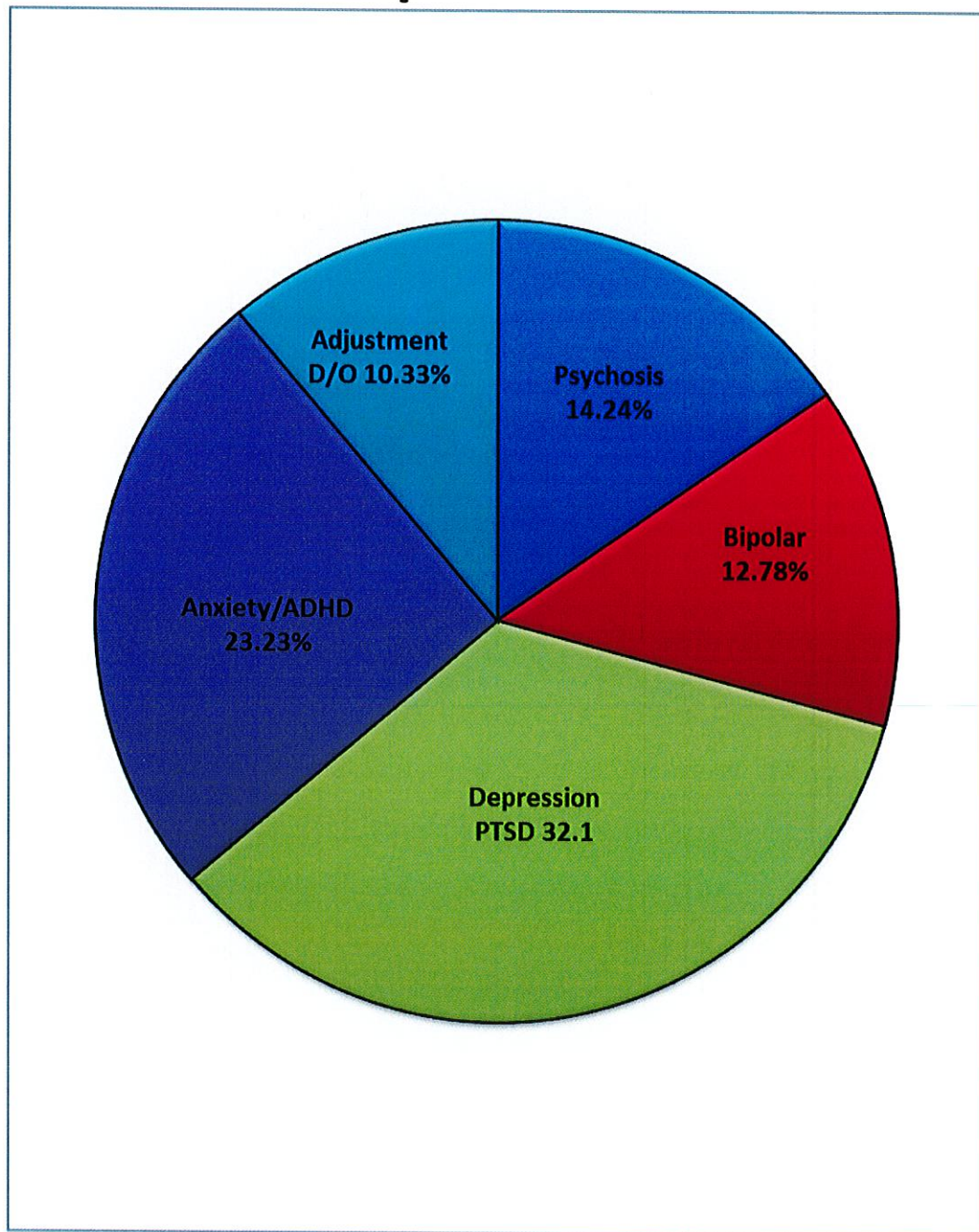


Mental Health Diagnosis & Psychiatric Medication

April 2023



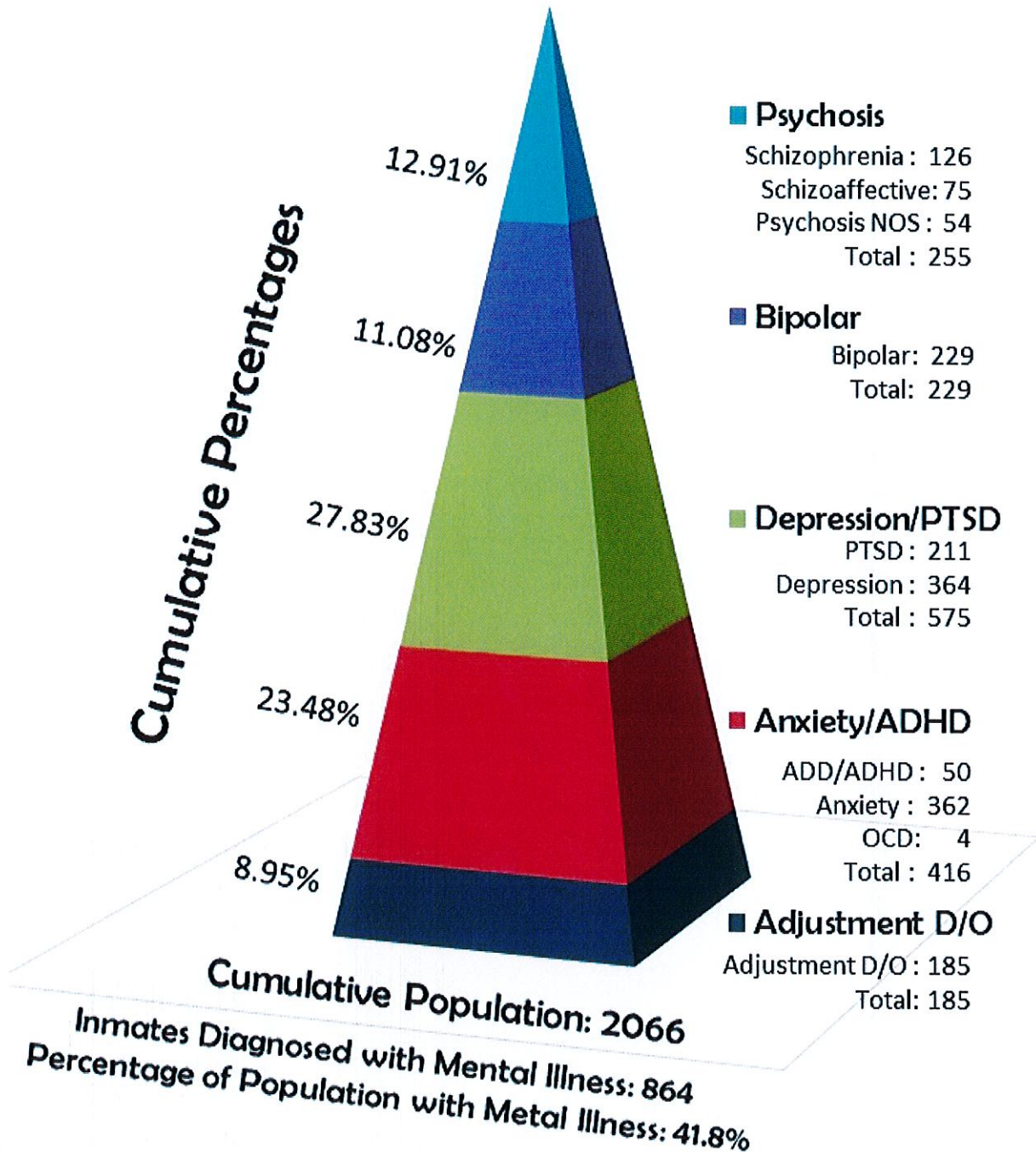

CNT – Crisis Negotiations Team

Training- Meeting was held on May 3rd to discuss membership and training objectives for the remainder of 2023.

Deployments-The Crisis Negotiations Team (CNT) was called out one time during the month of May. The correctional objective was met in this deployment without force. Dates of deployment and a brief synopsis is listed below.

- 5/9/2023 – Deployed to help facilitate a court appearance for an individual that was refusing to go to court. Negotiators were able to gain compliance through communication and complete the correctional objective without force or injury.

CERTT – Correctional Emergency Response Transport Team

Training: CERTT met 1 time this month for training in riot control and to perform physical testing on 13 current members.

Deployments: Three deployments during the month of May for a cell extractions.

- 5/8/2023 – Cell extraction on verbally aggressive AC inmate to remove urine filled milk containers from cell. Minimal force used an correctional objective achieved.
- 5/23/2023 -- Cell extraction combative administrative confinement inmate to unit 20. Inmate became actively aggressive and the Glove was deployed to gain compliance. Inmate was moved successfully to unit 20. No staff injuries reported.
- 5/28/2023 -- Cell extraction on a non-compliant inmate to facilitate transport from unit 20 to court. The mission was successful with no force.
- 5/21 to 5/23/23 -- CERTT staff used to provide security for the AJA conference.

Honor Guard

Training- May 10th trained and performed mock scenarios for DCDC Memorial Ceremony. May 13th trained for Law enforcement ceremony scheduled on the 15th at the Douglas County Sheriffs office.

Deployments- Honor Guard was deployed six times this month to assist with Corrections week, Law Enforcement month and AJA conference.

- 5/9/2023 – Performed Color Guard and flag presentation at the Douglas County Board meeting.
- 5/12/2023 – Memorial Ceremony for deceased Douglas County Corrections Officers to include wreath laying ceremony.
- 5/15/2023 – Participated in local Law Enforcement ceremony held at the Douglas County Sheriffs office.
- 5/19/2023 – Participated in Nebraska Memorial Service in Grand Island. A four-person team was sent to represent our department.
- 5/22/2023 – Performed presentation of Colors and National anthem to open the 42nd annual AJA Conference.

Searches
